Prior to presentation, communication and discussion involves the NFMC Bylaws Committee, Parliamentarian, and President.

To address unique challenges during the second pandemic year, it was necessary to seek Standing Rule approval from the Executive Committee which has the authority to address issues between regular Board meetings. Following the resignation of NFMC President, Frances Nelson, an emergency proposal was made and approved by the Executive Committee to enable the new president to appoint an NFMC Past National President to complete the unexpired term of the position of 1st Vice President. This approved proposal will be ratified at the Board Meeting in Indianapolis. Following the resignation of Louis Rose, NFMC Parliamentarian, the Executive Committee approved the proposal to hire Dr. Eugene Bierbaum, to complete the 2021-22 NFMC Parliamentarian's term.

I received 8 arts advocacy reports for the 2021-2022 NFMC club year.

Highlights include activities of the Music Club of Greenville, SC (MCOG) and Dushore Music Club of Dushore, PA.

MCOG has a PITCH Program (Providing Instruments to Children) in schools who can't afford to rent or purchase instruments. In addition, MCOG awarded \$6500 in grants to 15 different music programs in public schools. MCOG had a music program at Sigal Music Museum and is being chronologically recorded in a podcast for the Greenville Music History Project. MCOG recognized five members of the community for their work in arts advocacy by awarding them the MCOG Golden Note Award.

Dushore Music Club club is supportive of schools and stays in close contact with the music and art teachers. They advocate the arts as members of the Sullivan County Council on the Arts (SCCA); three of their members are active on their board of directors. All of their programs, special and monthly, are placed in the local newspaper, the Sullivan Review. They support the local library and often use the facility for displays for National Music Week and Parade of American Music. Members attend high school music concerts, and those on the SCCA attend the art and music celebration in May at the high school.

I attended the 2022 virtual National Arts Action Summit hosted by Americans for the Arts. A separate report of the Summit is attached.

NFMC Arts Advocacy Summit Report

I attended the 2022 virtual National Arts Action Summit March 28-30 hosted by Americans for the Arts. The event was free of charge for all participants. Several bills have been introduced during the 117th Congress concerning performing artists and musicians:

Performing Arts Tax Parity Act (PAPTA)

To amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to increase the adjusted gross income limitation for above-the-line deduction of expenses of performing artist employees, and for other purposes.

Earmarks are back! Earmarks were banned 2011-2021.

Member-Directed Spending and Community Project Funding can serve the arts.

<u>All Requests Online:</u> Members are required to post every Community Project Funding request online simultaneously with their submission to the Committee. The website must be searchable. The House Appropriations Committee will establish an online "one-stop" link to all House Members' Project requests.

Early Public Disclosure: To facilitate public scrutiny of Community Project Funding, the Committee will release a list of projects funded the same day as the Subcommittee markup, or 24 hours before full committee consideration if there was no Subcommittee markup.

No financial interest: Members must certify to the Committee that they, their spouse, and their immediate family have no financial interest in the projects they request. This is an expansion beyond the underlying requirements in House Rules to cover immediate families of Members.

In **FY2022** (last year) there were **3,012** earmark requests from House members in FY2022 appropriations bills. Members requested a total of **141** arts and culture earmarks, and **80** arts-adjacent earmarks amounting to \$290,000,000 in funding. **127** arts and culture earmarks were approved, **71** arts-adjacent earmarks were approved, about **\$225,000,000**.

NFMC ARCHIVES Report of the National Chair 2022

Important Archival material has been collected and added during 2021--2022. Approximately 200 additional photographs were identified and catalogued. All processed material except photographs has now been entered into Archivists' Toolkit which is available online at the NFMC website and is up-to-date through November 2018.

The McClatchey Foundation awarded the Archives a one thousand dollar grant to aid in hiring a professional Archivist to continue work on the collection This is the most important immediate goal in Archives work. While this has been a difficult year for work in the Archives this goal is still a priority and will be an ongoing project for the Archives.

I continue to receive requests for information from interested NFMC members and from scholars. Interest in the history of NFMC clearly indicates the necessity to digitize our collection. My recommendation for our first priority is uploading the entire publication of *Music Clubs Magazine* so that the issues are available online. The plan to upload the first fifty years of MCM to the website was postponed because of the covid-19 pandemic. The Archives Special Fund is now around thirty thousand dollars. So the money is available to support this project.

ARTS DIVISION REPORT-DR. OUIDA KECK, CHAIR-JUNE 2022, INDIANAPOLIS

The lines of communication were kept open during the pandemic by sending emails throughout the year to Arts Division Chairs and Regional Chairs. Articles were written for "Interlude" and "Music Clubs Magazine" on programming ideas during a pandemic. Replacements were secured for two regional positions that became open. All website forms were revised and updated. A workshop was planned for the state presidents at the 2022 Conference. Special thanks to the following chairs (their work highlights below) for the outstanding jobs they have done during these challenging times and times when activities and reporting numbers were down. Be sure to read their complete reports.

Chamber Music-Lorraine Peery Long-9 Sr. Clubs in 6 states submitted reports. Most programmed Chamber Music and a few financially supported chamber music groups. There seemed to be a trend in Irish Folk music being featured this year.

Crusade for Strings-Helena Meetze-15 Sr. Clubs and 3 Jr. Clubs from 6 states submitted reports. Over \$20,000 was given for string scholarships by clubs. \$25 awards were presented to 6 Sr. clubs and 2 Jr. Clubs for outstanding string programs and projects.

International Music Relations-Entry forms were submitted by 3 clubs with one Sr. club and one Jr. club being recipients of cash awards. Entry forms will be revised with clearer directives and program/project suggestions for applicants in the future.

Music in Poetry-Margarita Harvey-24 clubs from 13 states reported. Poetry leaders used poetry in their communications. All clubs reporting read poetry at their monthly meetings, a huge improvement since 2016 when no clubs did this. Thanks to "A Year in Verse" for helping to make this possible.

Music in Schools and Colleges-Joel Adams-Reports were sent from only 3 regions. Scholarships were given at 2 summer music centers to supplement NFMC Awards and scholarships were awarded to 5 institutions of higher learning.

Choral Music-Dr. Penny Draper-15 clubs from 5 states submitted reports. Choral scholarships were given by 3 but no choral works were commissioned this year. \$100 awards were given to 6 clubs for outstanding participation.

Together We Sing-Barbara Murray-40 reports were received indicating all used the "Together We Sing" books. The summer songs were not used. 3 states reported singing at board meetings.

Music Outreach-Lisa Thomas-8 clubs from 4 states reported being allowed to have some kind of outreach experience this year. A \$150 award was presented to the Sr. club with the highest number of community service hours. No individuals submitted entries for the monetary award.

Sacred Music-Karen Herndon-25 clubs from 7 states submitted reports on their limited in-person and virtual sacred music activities. 14 clubs received special recognition for outstanding programs and 19 members were reported as serving as church musicians for over 50 years each.

National Music Week-Ellen Leapaldt-Last year 23 clubs from 4 regions received certificates. In the Essay Contest this year 13 students received an award of \$75 each. The final reports for NMW are not due until after our national meeting.

Senior Clubs from the Northeastern, Southeastern and South Central Regions provided data for this report. NO REPORTS from North Central or Western Regions' chairs.

- 29 clubs have members who teach music in public/private schools
- 31 clubs have members who teach music at the collegiate level
- 33 clubs have members who teach music in afterschool/homeschool programs

In place of many bullet points of quantitative data, I am choosing to approach the remainder of this report with qualitative information from various, unnamed clubs and sources throughout the Northeastern, Southeastern and South Central Regions.

One collective region provided \$700 towards scholarship awards at two underserved summer music centers this past summer to supplement NFMC Awards at those institutions. It is the region's goal to make this a permanent annual gift through an endowment that will be created through donations from individuals within the region.

Another region held virtual auditions for scholarships to be awarded to 5 institutions of higher learning within the region. One of the winners was selected to perform at a state convention in 2023.

Many states within our regions hosted our NFMC Young Artists for programs at conferences or state meetings.

A progressive and active club invited a representative to speak about the SMARTS Program. SMARTS is an acronym for Students Motivated by the ARTS. This is a very interesting topic and one for which there is national data supporting the fact that students who participate in the arts in school tend to achieve more in their academic studies.

These are just a few examples from many of what is being accomplished by our clubs throughout the regions and nation, even in the face of covid which has impacted every aspect of our lives. We can be proud of the ongoing opportunities provided by NFMC. It is the dedication and love given by each individual member that creates the engine and provides the fuel for NFMC and her many local, regional, and national accomplishments.

NFMC Outreach Committee Report

2021/2022

The past twelve months have brought many challenges for Senior Clubs throughout the country who sought to undertake community outreach opportunities in their communities. Finding organizations willing to host outsiders during the COVID-19 pandemic was nearly impossible for many club coordinators. However, eight clubs from four states submitted reports that showed the community spirit remains strong in spite of challenges.

While four states submitted NFMC form AR-2's for senior club participation, none were submitted for individuals. The \$150 award for the club with the highest number of community service hours went to the Warren County Music Club in Lebanon, Ohio. They had a combined total of 3,474 hours of service in their senior center retirement center. Their club is housed in the Otterbein Retirement Center, and all of the televised and live programs took place in this community for persons totally confined in their nursing home section. They had singers, ringers, and concerts of all kinds.

As the National Outreach Chair, I was particularly pleased that the Warren County Music Club sent a detailed report about how their hours were spent.

The total number of hours, per-state, that were given for community service were:

- Ohio 3,474
- Mississippi 20
- South Carolina 397
- North Dakota 492

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF MUSIC CLUBS Arts Division - Sacred Music May 2022

Although NFMC national meetings were cancelled two consecutive years, and public meetings were all halted for a time, many NFMC clubs have gradually begun to meet again. Still cautious and mindful of health guidelines, ambitious members have found creative ways to share sacred music in their communities, with combinations of virtual meetings and in-person gatherings. Sacred music was performed in nursing homes, hospitals, and interfaith programs, as complete programs or included in other programs. As always, NFMC clubs rose to the challenge and brought the joy and comfort of sacred music to their communities.

To mention a few: Pennsylvania's Dushore Music Club presented several complete scared music programs, one entitled "Wings on the Mountain," and Lakeshore held "Scottish Harp Music." Carthage Music Club in Texas offered "The Stained Glass Concert," interpreting the church's windows through music. Kentucky's Cecilian Club held monthly programs including sacred music. In South Carolina, Rock Hill Music Club presented "A History of American Hymnody and Hymn Song," while Eau Claire Music Club offered all sacred music in "Sunday Southern Favorites." NFMC Report on Emil and Ruth Beyer Composition Awards, 2022

The report this year, in a strange year right after the pandemic when we have not been able to see one another face to face at NFMC, will be in the form of a list of reflections on my work assembled in no particular order but nevertheless deeply experienced:

- 1. Thanks to the Music Clubs as part of Federation, and especially to the Jeannine Morris "Warren Music Club" where my wife and I are members, I have had the opportunity to work with this competition for five or six years now.
- 2. The administrative work is modest.
- 3. We need to have more entries, but the half a dozen that we do attract each year are talented and fully qualified young composers.
- 4. Each year I have used the same two judges, composers and university instructors of theory and composition, whom I have come to know over my own long career in higher education. I am not a musician myself; my wife is the musician in the family. I love music and love the notion of creative work. Further, I have had some experience with administration at my University.
- 5. My favorite part of this work is talking about the results with the winners as well as what I learn about the overall young career of each composer.
- 6. This year we had three winners: a winner in piano solo as well as a first and second place winner in Chamber Music. We had no entries in the composition for voice category.
- 7. The winner in piano solo had won two awards in previous years: a voice award and a first place in Chamber Music. He is truly an outstanding young man with whom I have talked over the years. My judges, of course, have only a pen name for each entrant they judge. Therefore, this "hat trick" for our piano solo this year is a genuine third win.
- 8. I sent news about each of our three winners this year to the State President of Federation in their respective states. The piano solo winner is based in Wisconsin (now he is in school in New York City). The first place Chamber Music winner is based in Florida; the second place winner in Chamber Music is based in Ohio.
- 9. In the past I have written an article about the competition winners each year for the Music Clubs Magazine; this year something has happened to that magazine.
- 10. There was, also, some confusion this year about who the National Treasurer is; I had to resolve that in order to get my winners paid their Awards.
- 11. The system for paying my judges worked well.
- 12. The NFMC website is very functional and works well.
- 13. I was trained originally by Ouida Keck. George Keck is now my "boss" at NFMC. Both are very helpful.
- 14. The Beyers ought to be pleased with how their money is able to stimulate all this work and thought and forward movement. 15. Art and personal incentive are real blessings.

2022 NFMC Veterans Awards Competitions Paul Brady, Chair

NFMC holds an annual composition competition for current members of the Armed Forces (American Music in the U.S. Armed Forces Composition Competition) and two scholarship award competitions for veterans who pursue degree programs in music following their military service – the Lucille Parrish Ward Veterans Award (held annually) and the Anne M. Gannett Veterans Award (held biennially). This year eight applications were received for the American Music in the US Armed Forces and no applications were received for the annual Ward competition.

Promotion efforts for these competitions began in November of last year with a mass mailing to various military music organizations located here in the States and overseas. Inquiries about the competitions were received from potential applicants over the next several months and many of them followed through with applications for the competitions. During this time, I asked two prominent and qualified professional musicians to judge these competitions – Dr. Robert Shuffett, currently president of our local music club, and Mr. Tyler Mire, currently a doctoral student in composition at George Mason University and a former member of the US Navy Band in Washington, DC.

Some minor issues occurred with loading applications on the NFMC website but seemed to be corrected easily. Judging was delayed slightly after the May 1st deadline for applications in order to identify a qualified second judge, however the judges acted quickly in reviewing the recordings and scores submitted. They conferred and provided their decisions to me by May 20. Applications received for the American Music in the Armed Forces included:

2022 TAX EXEMPTION REPORT

The purpose of the Tax Exemption Chairman is to provide simple and cost free IRS 501(c)(3) tax exemption for NFMC regions, state federations, districts, and local clubs. As of May 10, 2022 the NFMC 501(c)(3) Group Exemption includes five Regions, six State Federations, three Districts, and 115 local clubs. Three local clubs have applied to be added to the group but have not been approved. Four local clubs have been approved since the 2021 report.

National Federation of Music Clubs Federation Festivals Report May 2022

Festivals remain a very large component of NFMC's Junior Division. The Festivals program provides an adjudicated performance opportunity for entrants to receive evaluation. This is the primary short-term goal—an educational experience that is positive, enlightening, and constructive. American music is the core repertoire performed for Festivals. Participants also have the opportunity to earn gold/silver cups by accumulating points based on ratings over several years. This provides a long-term goal for students. The wide variety of events within the Festivals program provide solo and ensemble opportunities to create well-rounded performance experiences. Musicianship skills can also be assessed thru the improvisation, theory, and sight playing/singing events.

Many Festivals were held in-person this year as Covid-19 concerns diminished. Virtual Festivals also continued as a viable option for those who were unable to participate in a live audition. Dedicated chairs/admins at the regional, state, and area level worked tirelessly to promote and organize participation in the 105 events listed in the *Bulletin*. **In 2021, there were 70,532 total entries.** (See the *Combined Stats by Section* and *Additional Statistics* documents for further details.) The 2022 report will be available at the Conference.

Despite all this effort, Festival entries have been on a decline for several years. There has been a **30 % decrease in entries** from 2016 to 2021. (See *Festival Entries 2016-2021* document for further details.) Future endeavors will focus on improving the Festivals program to better serve our members and by working with other divisions to develop strategies to increase entries.

Highlights of chair/admin activity to date:

- Communicated with regional and state chairs/admins to provide information regarding Festival policies and procedures.
- Revised all JR forms related to Festival for the NFMC website. Distributed updated forms to state chairs/admins.
- Updated the State Festivals Chairs/Admins database and created a list of all Festival Areas in each state.
- Submitted articles for Junior Keynotes and other publications.
- Worked with state, regional, and local chairs/admins to resolve issues as they presented.
- Collected certificate/theory test orders from the state chairs/admins; forwarded orders to NFMC headquarters for distribution; distributed theory tests to the state chairs/admins.
- Spoke at the Minnesota State Convention, the Texas State Convention, and the Georgia Festivals Chairs Annual Meeting.
- Served on the Vivace Team and as an onboarding coach, regional support person, and on the Vivace Help System Committee.
- Began to work with the *Bulletin* Editor in preparation for the 2024 *Bulletin*.
- Conducted several Festivals Committee meetings via Zoom. Regional Chairs/Admins had gathered information from the states as to pressing issues, suggestions, and other feedback. Vigorous discussion was held about various topics. These meetings resulted in several recommendations to Festival rules and policies which will be presented to the Junior Division at the Conference.
- Processed approximately fifty Specially Capable Musician applications.
- Processed almost sixty 12-Year (and higher) Consecutive Superior certificates and letters.

It is hopeful that as significant changes to Festivals are adopted, membership increases, and Vivace is fully implemented by all Festivals, we can see a turnaround in registrations for Festival as more students experience this wonderful opportunity.

First of all, let me say what an honor it is to be a part of the Junior Division, specifically Festivals, and continue the work of the many competent Bulletin editors who have gone before me. I am eager to further the worthy objectives of Junior Festivals. Having only been in this position since February 22, and reviewing the to-do list, I must say that it is quite daunting! However, here is the progress so far.

• Advisors — nearly all the former advisors have been contacted, and, as a courtesy, asked if they would like to continue. Only five have declined thus far. So, we are off to a good start. Advisors are pleased with the "team" concept of choosing repertoire this Bulletin cycle.

With the music print industry changing so rapidly, we are stressing accuracy in the *availability* of published music whether hard copy or online.

We will also remind the advisors of the need for varying technical demand in each class, as well as variety of style, length, sophistication, and mood.

- New Events we are not anticipating any new events being added to the 2024-2028 Bulletin. In fact, in events or upper levels of events where there has been little recent participation or no participation, we are considering archiving them to condense the Bulletin.
- **Publishers** a number of publishers (and composers who have created their own publishing companies because of industry changes) are already contacting us with questions regarding submissions for consideration in the next Bulletin. We are working on a timeline for submissions, entering repertoire in Vivace, proofing, and such.
- Online Bulletin—

Considerations and discussions for an online Bulletin are currently underway. There has been much demand.

Hard Copy Bulletin —

National Federation of Music Clubs Vivace Report

We are nearing the home stretch! This project was started at our NFMC Conference in 2008 and has culminated in Vivace, NFMC's Online Festival Management System. Vivace has proven its ability to safeguard the integrity of NFMC's festivals, maintain a national database of performances, and reduce the workload of volunteers across the nation. The Vivace Team is ready to help all festival areas complete the transition to suing Vivace for the 2022-2023 festival year.

Our onboarding chair, Sadie Cole, has been working hard to contact all State Festival Chairs and get an assessment of where we stand. As of May 15, 2022, 199 Festival areas are completely onboarded and using Vivace for registration and reporting. 61 festival areas which have begun the onboarding process and the remaining 138 NFMC festival areas will need to complete onboarding this summer and fall before they can use Vivace for their 2022-2023 festivals.

The onboarding process starts by submitting an application. Afterwards, a ZOOM meeting with two local Festival Area Admins and a Vivace trainer is held during which these Area Admins are granted access to Vivace. Also, during this meeting their festival area is created in Vivace with their desired settings. Festival area-specific training of Vivace's functionalities is provided.

As local NFMC members become comfortable with Vivace, the NFMC Vivace Team asks those who have shown competence in the workings of Vivace to act as a State Vivace Admin. This is sometimes a different person than the State Festivals Chair. The purpose of this position is to resolve Vivace questions at the state level and thus ease the workload of the NFMC Vivace Team.

A "wish list" for future functions will be reviewed annually by the NFMC Vivace Team and the NFMC Executive Committee. Using the Festival fee funds collected for Vivace each year decisions will be made as to what additions, alterations, or refinements will be implemented. All "wish list" items will be reviewed and prioritized according to need and available finances of the Vivace fund account. For instance:

• A report is needed for states with festival areas that allow registrants to opt out of Federation Cup participation. Treasurers need to know which students are participating to calculate the Federation Cup fees that are owed to their state's Cup Fund.

• Local Festival Area Admins have requested various additional scheduling capabilities be added to the "wish list".

• And many, many other suggestions from both local festival Area and State Admins.

National Federation of Music Clubs NFMC Stillman Kelley/Byrum Piano Awards Linda Maurhoff, NFMC Chair

The Stillman Kelley competition was established in 1938 for the continued musical education of exceptionally talented junior members of the National Federation of Music Clubs. To honor the eminent music educator, composer and leader who had done so much for music in this country, the competition was named the "Edgar Stillman Kelley Scholarship." Later, in recognition of his wife's accomplishments as the eleventh president of the National Federation of Music Clubs (1925-1929) and her continuing interest in the musical youth of our nation through the many years until her death in 1949, the award was changed to honor both members of the NFMC's distinguished husband-wife team. The Thelma Byrum Piano Award was added in 1980. It goes to the top scorer in piano, unless that is the Stillman Kelley winner; in that case, the Byrum Award goes to the next-highest scorer in piano.

Cellist William Tan is a student of Hans Jorgen Jensen, Professor of Cello at Northwestern's Bienen School of Music. Other solo wins include Gold Prize at the 2021 Camerata Artists International Competition and First Place at the 2020 MTNA National String Competition. Most recently, William was a finalist in the Johansen 2022 International Competition and received the Judges Commendation Prize. As a passionate chamber musician, William is a member of the Aster Trio and is coached by Desiree Ruhstrat. The trio won the 2022 Rembrandt Young Artists Chamber Music Competition and the 2022 Chicago National Chamber Music Competition. William has been a featured guest on From the Top and during summers, he has attended Orford Music Academy, Music@Menlo, and Meadowmount. This summer he will be touring Europe as a member of the National Youth Orchestra. A junior at the University of Chicago Laboratory School, William is an assistant editor of the U-High Midway, a varsity debater, competitive chess player, and an avid skier.

Cory Wu – 2nd Place Stillman Kelley and Thelma Byrum Piano Award

Cory Wu is a 16 year old pianist and a junior at Columbus Academy. He has studied piano with Kathleen Sadoff since 2012 and also with Nina Polonsky since 2020. He has won 1st place at numerous piano competitions and festivals, including OFMC(2021), 2020 Piano League PianoStar International Piano Competition, 2019 Ohio State MTNA, 2019 Carmel Klavier Concerto Competition, 2020 MTNA Eastern Central Division, and the Columbus Symphony Orchestra's Young Music Concerto No. 2 in G minor after winning the NASO Student Concerto Competition. In addition, Cory has participated in other various national music events such as the David D. Dubois International Piano Competition Intensive. In 2021, he received the NFMC's Thelma Byrum award, third place in the Stillman Kelley awards, and second place in the Marilyn Caldwell awards. Also, he is one of the recipients of 2021 Chopin Scholarship and was named as one of the winners (honorable mention) by national YoungArts Foundation. Cory and his duet partner (Katia Jacoby) has played together at Pianorama festivals and competitions since they were 10 years old. They won 3rd place at 2018 Ohio Duo and Duet International Competition, second place at 2020 International Chamber Music Ensemble Competition of the Chamber Music Foundation of New England, and made to 2021 MTNA National Duet Finals. Outside of piano, Cory is involved within his community. Recently, he led a team that raised over \$18,000 for cancer research with the LLS, and also regularly performs at nursing homes and hospitals around his community. He also plays soccer and tennis and likes to cook.

Humphrey Xu – 3rd Place

Humphrey Xu started playing the piano at the age of six, and studies under Dr. Matthew Loudermilk. Humphrey won First Prize with Special Honors at the Sonatina and Sonata competition in 2019, as well as first place at the 2020 Texas State Piano Competition, and was invited on a full scholarship to the Texas State International Piano Festival. In 2019, Humphrey performed Shostakovich's second concerto with the Clear Lake symphony orchestra as a result of winning the Clear Lake Concerto Competition. He has performed in Weill Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York, MATCH Concert Hall, and the Houston Hobby Center. As a member of IMA Virtuosi, Humphrey has also performed in master classes taught by Dr. Robert Roux and Nancy Weems.

Outside of piano, Humphrey enjoys reading, playing tennis, and participating in programming competitions. He is a junior at Memorial High School in Houston, Texas.

The 70,246 Junior Club members defiantly outnumber the 10,390 Senior Club members in NFMC. I'm sure the thrill of doing festivals inspires juniors and their teachers to be members of the Federation. There are 8,859 student members that can be documented. With universities doing mass enrollment, it is impossible to get an accurate count of student members. Utah comes in with the highest number of junior members followed closely by Texas and Ohio. For Utah, this is due to over 6,000 junior members. Michigan weighs in with the highest number of senior members with Virginia and Texas right behind.

There were 16 NFMC Life Members added this year.

Heidi Hong's Course of Study report is included with this report. Linda Flick had 17 states participate in Senior Club Reporting. Linda would like to make that 100% of the 43 states that are members of NFMC. The North East Region leads in monetary contributions but the grand total from all regions of monetary contributions totaled \$268,712. And that's with just 40% of our states reporting. The Student-Collegiate Division faced a few challenges this year but finished strong with the help of new chairs and interim chair. We appreciated the help of NFMC Publications chair, Julie Watson for placing award deadlines and opportunities on the NFMC FaceBook page. Despite the combined efforts of chairs and NFMC, there were still some awards that went unclaimed due to lack of applicants.

There are three awards that are biennial and not awarded in the even years, but we are already gearing up for 2023 with the Student-Collegiate Auditions offering \$3,000 to 11 different instrument/voice categories, changes to be voted on for the Wiegand Sacred Music of the Faiths award and LFO Pedagogy award of \$5,000. The deadline for Auditions applications is February 15, 2023. Now is the time to encourage collegiates to prepare the repertoire and submission videos.

Of the nine awards given annually in the Student-Collegiate Division, only the guitar and Nelson Double Reed awards had multiple applicants.

Of the possible four <u>composition</u> awards only the Marion Richter award of \$1,250 was awarded to a student at Bowling Green State University in Ohio.

<u>Music Ed</u> awards are provided for college sophomores and juniors. The Mehan/Morgan Music Education scholarship went to a sophomore at the University of Akron in Akron, Ohio and the Van Roy Music Education award when to a well-deserving student at the University of Alabama. Her sense of gratitude was encouraging, and her written style of correspondence was professional. <u>Sacred Music of Faiths</u> award, chair, Dr. Paula Savaglio has made a proposal to expand the parameters of eligibility for this award. We have had no winners for this award since 2017 mainly due to the limited requirements and changing landscape of music majors as colleges adjust to fewer church music degree offerings and applicants.

Although there are 3 awards in <u>Music Therapy</u>, only one application was received for the second year in a row. The Dorothy Dann Bullock (\$1500), Ruth B. Robertson music therapy scholarship (\$650) and the Irma Carey Wilson music therapy scholarship (\$750) were all awarded to one very qualified candidate from the University of Alabama.

The performance awards all had entrants and were awarded to qualified and deserving collegiates. Two of these award winners will be heard in performance during Musical Moments at the 2022 Indianapolis NFMC Conference: Isabella Brown, the 2022 recipient of the Oscar Valentin Violin Award and Michael Vasocnes, the 2022 NFMC Classical Guitar Award. Michael is a student at Manhattan School of Music in New York, where there is no active senior organization, so we are fortunate that the NE Region is providing support for his appearance. We were pleased to be able to award the Paris French Horn award with the help of new award chair, Roger Lear. It seemed that late submissions and difficulty in uploading videos plagued us this year and we continue to work towards improvement in those details.

The overriding goal for 2023 will be to find ways of spreading the word of the awards in a timely manner and in wider geographical regions of United States. A concerted effort will be made to engage NFMC state presidents in advertising these competitions to local and regional colleges and universities. A lot has been learned through difficult circumstances and we will be all the better for these as we travel into the future with renewed hope and steadfast resolve.

I want to personally thank all the award chairs for their tireless efforts to promote NFMC and provide award opportunities and especially those who stepped in at the last minute to meet deadlines. This team is the BEST!!

Report on the biennial Elizabeth Wiegand Music of the Faiths Award

This year we took advantage of time during our "off" year to discern whether we should re-word the requirements for this award in order to expand eligibility. Currently, the award is open to students enrolled in college Church Music degree programs and is thus unavailable to college students majoring in organ or conducting or vocal music.

Since I took over as chair of this award in 2019, I have had to turn away a few interested would-be applicants – for example, organ majors; they intended to work in church once they graduated (and they had experience in church music), but the school in which they were enrolled did not offer a specific degree in church music.

There was some discussion after I brought this issue to the attention of the collegiate awards division in the summer and fall of 2021 (our main concern was to follow the intentions of the late ElizabethWiegand), but due to a technological glitch during a zoom meeting this past winter, we could not proceed with our discussion. Hopefully I can present at our June meeting, and we will resolve the issue to the good of the award in time for our 2023 competition.

I am pleased to announce that Isabella Brown is the 2022 Recipient of the Oscar Valentin Violin Award.

Eighteen-year-old Isabella Brown of Gurnee, Illinois has recently been making a name for herself on the classical music scene. She won a top prize in the 2019 Cooper International Violin Competition and subsequently performed with the Cleveland Orchestra. Critics wrote that Isabella exhibited "complete control," "soared out nicely over the big orchestra," and "delivered an intensely lyrical and scintillating performance of the Dvořák Violin Concerto." Isabella went on to win the 2020 Crain-Maling Foundation CSO Young Artist Competition is also set to debut with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in an upcoming season.

She has won first place in numerous other competitions including the 2020 Chicago International Music Competition, the Alexander and Buono International String Competition, the Chinese Fine Arts Society Music Festival in Honor of Confucius, the Sejong Music Competition, the MYA Walgreens National Concerto Competition, and the DePaul Concerto Festival.

Isabella made her solo debut with orchestra at the age of ten, performing with the Capitol Symphonic Youth Orchestra at the Kennedy Center, and has gone on to play with the Oistrakh Symphony of Chicago, the Waukegan Symphony Orchestra, the New North Shore Symphony Orchestra, the Northbrook Symphony Orchestra, the Lakeview Orchestra, the DuPage Symphony Orchestra, the Elmhurst Symphony Orchestra, the Kishwaukee Symphony, the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, and the Cleveland Orchestra.

In addition to performing solo music, Isabella enjoys playing chamber music. Her Dasani String Quartet was awarded the Silver Medal in the Junior Division of the 2020 Fischoff Chamber Music Competition, and tied for the Grand Prize in the Amateur Division of the 2020 Chicago International Music Competition. She appeared with that quartet on *Introductions* in <u>May 2020</u>, and previously appeared on the show in <u>March 2020</u>, June 2019, December 2017, and with her older brothers Nicholas and Joshua in June 2014. She also performed a Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concert in <u>October 2020</u>.

Isabella studies with Almita Vamos as a Scholarship Fellow at the Music Institute of Chicago Academy, and this fall she will begin studying with Martin Beaver at the Colburn School in Los Angeles. Isabella is very thankful to play on a Dom Nicolò Marchioni detto 'Amati' violin from Bologna circa 1740, generously on loan to her from Kenneth Warren and Son.

Isabella is the younger sibling of Joshua Brown, who was the 2020 Oscar Valentin Violin recipient.

Congratulations to Isabella, and best regards to a very bright future as a violinist.
