



As a performer you'll find Cathy in a broad range of arenas: concert and festival stages in the US and abroad, at world viewed events including the Opening Ceremonies for the World Swimming Championships, Indianapolis International Violin Competition and repeatedly in front of 250,000 people at the Formula One and Indy 500 races.

Cathy and her band have opened for Al Jareau, Burt Bacharach, George Benson, Chuck Mangione, Rick Braun, four Play and Najee to name a few and can regularly be seen as the guest soloist performing her original music with orchestras and jazz bands.

As a musical ambassador she has performed for world leaders and dignitaries including Mikail Gorbachev, the Prince and Princess of Serbia, President Bill Clinton, Senator Hillary Clinton, First Lady Laura Bush and the Japanese Ambassador Kenichiro Sasae among others.

As a **recording artist** Cathy has five CDs of original music in addition to her holiday disc A Cathy Morris Christmas, the '05 release Cathy Morris Latin Jazz, 2006 release Sacred Romance: violin and piano duets accompanying Sufi poetry, 2007 Music For Wellness audio and video meditation series and 2018 Latin Jazz II.

As an **educator** it's her unending commitment to children that puts her in front of and collaborating with literally thousands of students each year performing convocations, conducting workshops and performing her original music in side by side concerts with student orchestras.

As a **composer/arranger** you can find Cathy's original music for string orchestra published by FJH Music, Inc in addition to her catalog of over one hundred other works for strings, solo with orchestra and jazz band.

To her credit as a **producer** is Arts With A Purpose nonprofit, annual Indianapolis Jazz Foundation Holiday Jazz Showcase, Indianapolis National String Improv Conference 2000, One World In Music Family Concert Series and additional recordings: Here For You - a compilation recording of all women's music benefiting Indianapolis Women's Fund and Sacred Romance, benefiting WICR Journey's Fire.

38TH INFANTRY DIVISION BAND

The 38th Infantry Division Band is commanded by Chief Warrant Officer Four Patrick Palumbo. Headquartered in Indianapolis, the 43-member unit was organized in 1917 and remains the only military band in the state of Indiana. The Band has performed in a wide variety of events throughout their history, including: military ceremonies and funerals, bugler support, governor inaugurations, pregame and halftime support for professional sports teams, concerts, and parades in both military and civic capacities throughout the state.

Since its formation in 1917, the band has maintained a long and proud history with the 38th Division. The band saw action in the European theater during World War I and the Philippines during World War II. At that time the 38th Division became known as "The Avengers of Bataan."

The 38th Infantry Division Band is comprised of several music performance teams, including: The Concert Band, The Ceremonial Band, The Brass Quintet, The Jazz Combo, and The Show Band. All of which are in high demand.



The band is a versatile organization which performs a wide variety of music including marches, traditional, and patriotic selections, as well as jazz and popular musical styles. Notable performances for the band include appearances with country artists Winona Judd and Josh Turner, and for political dignitaries at the state and national level.

ISABFLLA BROWN

Nineteen year old American violinist Isabella Brown has recently been making a name for herself on the classical music scene. In 2019 Isabella

was awarded a top prize in the Cooper International Violin Competition and consequently had the privilege of debuting with the Cleveland Orchestra at the age of sixteen. Her performance was praised by critics who wrote that Isabella exhibited complete control," "soared out nicely over the big orchestra," and delivered an intensely lyrical and scintillating performance of the Dvořák Violin Concerto." More recently. Isabella was named the Winner of the Crain-Mailing CSO Young Artist Competition, and as such, debuted with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra during the 2021-2022 season. She was also awarded First Prize in the Professional Division (Young Artist II Category) at the 2020 Chicago International Music Competition (from a pool of over 400 musicians from 22 countries), won the 2022 National Federation of Music Club's Oscar Valentin Violin Award, was named a 2019 National YoungArts Foundation Winner, and received First Place in numerous competitions, including the Alexander and Buono International String Competition, the Asian American International Music Competition, the Rockville Competition

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for Piano and Strings, the Chinese Fine Arts Society Music Festival in Honor of Confucius Competition, the Sejong Music Competition (both the Junior and Senior divisions), the Open Junior String Division of the MYA Walgreens National Concerto Competition, the DePaul Concerto Festival for Young Performers, the Lakeview Orchestra Competition, the DuPage Symphony Orchestra Competition, and the Kishwaukee Symphony Montzka Young Artist Competition. Isabella made her solo debut with orchestra at the age of ten, performing with the Capital Symphonic Youth Orchestra on the Kennedy Center's Terrace Theater stage, and has gone on to play with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Cleveland Orchestra, the Oistrakh Symphony Orchestra, the Waukegan Symphony Orchestra, the New North Shore Symphony Orchestra, the Northbrook Symphony Orchestra, the Lakeview Orchestra, the DuPage Symphony Orchestra, the Elmhurst Symphony Orchestra, the Kishwaukee Symphony, the Highland Park Strings, and the Civic Orchestra of Chicago. Additionally, she has been featured on Chicago's WFMT and on Cleveland's WCLV, appeared in both the Dame Myra Hess series in Chicago and the Alden Theater Young Soloist Series in Virginia, and has performed at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center in Washington DC, the Chicago Cultural Center, Cleveland's Severance Hall, Chicago's Harris Theater, Ravinia's Bennett Gordon Hall, and Chicago's Symphony Center. In addition to performing solo music, Isabella is an ardent chamber musician. Her Academy string quartet was featured on WFMT's Introductions, was chosen as one of only two Junior Finalists in the 2020 WDAV Young Chamber Musicians Competition, was awarded the Silver Medal in the Junior Division of the 2020 Fischoff Chamber Music Competition, and tied for the Grand Prize in the Amateur Division of the 2020 Chicago International Music Competition. Isabella is on full scholarship at the Colburn Conservatory of Music where she studies violin performance with Martin Beaver. She previously studied violin with Almita and Roland Vamos as a Scholarship Fellow at the Music Institute of Chicago Academy. Isabella is very thankful to be playing on a Dom Nicolo Marchioni detto 'Amati' of Bologna circa 1740, generously on loan to her from Kenneth Warren and Son, Ltd.



DR. JAMES WEAVER

Dr. James Weaver is the Director of Performing Arts and Sports for the National Federation of State High School Associations. Originally from Aberdeen, SD, Dr. Weaver is a 2001 graduate of Aberdeen (SD) Central High School. He has been a teacher and administrator at the district, state, and national level.

Weaver began his professional career in 2005 as director of orchestras for the Perham (Minnesota) Public Schools for

two years, followed by a four-year stint as director of orchestras for the Aberdeen

(South Dakota) Public Schools. Under his leadership, the Aberdeen program grew to record levels, and his orchestras have consistently been given high marks at local and regional contests.

Weaver began his tenure at the NFHS in 2016 as the director of performing arts and sports with the charge of increasing participation, professional development, and awareness of performing arts activities throughout the nation's high schools. He has created partnerships with several national arts organizations to create a robust advocacy network. Formed several committees to create professional development courses for music and speech adjudicators, new music teachers and contest managers, as well as safety programs for marching band and theater use. The NFHS created the standard for copyright education and compliance under Weaver's leadership with the creation of the NFHS Copyright and Compliance Learn Course and the Copyright Compliance Database.

Dr. Weaver served as the co-chair of the International Coalition for Performing Arts Aerosol study. The study was influential during the COVID-19 global pandemic, giving guidance to schools, states, national and international organizations for a return to performing arts activities. Bringing together 125 performing arts organizations this effort involved the largest coalition of performing arts organizations for a single purpose. Dr. Weaver currently serves as the president of the National Music Council as well as on several other national music boards and policy committees.

As the district administrator of the fine and performing arts programs for the Sioux Falls (SD) schools, Weaver administered the K-12 curriculum for music, visual arts, speech, debate, theatre, journalism, student council and special education adaptive arts. He was responsible for 140 staff members across 37 buildings, rewriting of the K-12 fine arts curriculum and a multimillion-dollar budget.

Before he joined the Sioux Falls schools in August 2015, Weaver was assistant executive director in charge of fine arts for the South Dakota High School Activities Association (SDHSAA) for four years. In addition to handling four all-state music ensembles, speech, debate, theatre, journalism and student council, Weaver started a visual arts component within the SDHSAA. He also transferred all of the association's music programs to an online ballot system, which increased the speed and improved the accuracy of the music adjudication processes.

Dr. Weaver earned a bachelor of music degree from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota, a master's degree in educational administration and

leadership from Northern State University in Aberdeen, South Dakota, and his doctorate in school district administration and educational leadership from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion, South Dakota. In 2011 Weaver was named "Outstanding Arts Educator" by the Aberdeen Area Arts Council. In 2021 Weaver was inducted as an honorary lifetime member of Kappa Kappa Psi, and received the Distinguished Service Award from the SDHSAA.



FRANK FELICE

is an eclectic composer who writes with a postmodern mischievousness. His commissions have included funding from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Omaha Symphony, the Indiana Arts Commission, The Indiana Repertory Theatre, Dance Kaleidoscope, Music Teachers National Association, the Wyoming

State Arts Board, the Indianapolis Youth Symphony, Kappa Kappa Psi/Tau Beta Sigma as well as many private commissions and consortia.

Frank began his musical studies in Hamilton, Montana, singing, playing piano, guitar and double bass. His interest in composition began through participation with a number of rock bands, one of which, Graffiti, toured the western United States and the Far East in 1986-1987. He attended Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota, the University of Colorado, and Butler University. Most recently he studied with Dominick Argento, Alex Lubet, Lloyd Ultan, and Judith Lang Zaimont at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, where he completed his Ph.D in 1998. Frank currently teaches as an associate professor of composition, theory and electronic music in the School of Music, Jordan College of Arts at Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana.

He is member of the Society for Electro-Acoustic Music in the U.S., the American Composers Forum, the American Music Center, The Society of Composers Inc., and the Christian Fellowship of Art Music Composers. In recent years he has been in demand as an electric and upright bassist, playing in various rock/funk/prog rock/big bands in the greater Indianapolis area. In addition to musical interests, he pursues his creative muse through painting, poetry, cooking, home brewing, paleontology, theology, philosophy, and model railroading. He is very fortunate to be married to mezzo-soprano Mitzi Westra.

SHAINA MARTINEZ

Shaina Martinez, has been hailed by the Washington Post for her "piercing, muscular soprano". She has performed Violetta (La Traviata), Susannah (Susannah) and Donna Anna (Don Giovanni) with Lighthouse Opera Company, Cio Cio San and Kate Pinkerton (Madama Butterfly) with Florida Grand Opera, Fiordiligi (Cosi fan tutte) and Saffi (Der Zigeunerbaron) with Manhattan School of Music, Salud (La Vida Breve) with The In Series, and Zweite Dame (Die Zauberflöte) and Prince Charmant (Cendrillon) with

the Siena Music Festival. As an active competitor she has received 1st place from the 2019 Eisenberg-Fried Concerto Competition, 2019 Russell C. Wonderlic Competition, and 2019 Talents of the World International Competition; 2nd place from the 2019 Opera NEO Voice Competition and MIOpera Vocal Competition; and 3rd place from the Washington International Competition, the XXI Concurso Internacional de Canto Lirico, and Alan M. & Joan Taub Ades Competition. Ms. Martinez also has a love for art song which has been expressed in her performances in the Opera America Emerging Artist Recital with Craig Rutenberg, and her performance of Joaquin Turina's Poema en forma de canciones with the MSM Philharmonia, under the baton of Perry So. She also has a special interest in nonstandard Latin American repertoire which she has performed in several NYC concert venues. Young Artist Programs include: Martina Arroyo's Prelude to Performance (2015), Grant Park Music Festival's Project Inclusion Fellowship (2019), and Florida Grand Opera (2019-2021). She is also an avid choral singer and maintains a soprano position at Calvary St. George in NYC. She holds a Bachelor's degree from University of Maryland and a Master's degree from Manhattan School of Music. She was a 2021 Met Council semifinalist and upcoming engagements include Giannetta and Adina (cover) with Opera Maine in July 2021 and Violetta in Mass Opera's production of La Traviata in October 2021.

JOHN-HENRY CRAWFORD

Born in the small Louisiana city of Shreveport, cellist John-Henry Crawford has been lauded for his "polished charisma" and "singing sound" (Philadelphia Inquirer) and in 2019 was First Prize Winner of the IX International Carlos Prieto Cello Competition and Young Artist of the Year

by the Classical Recording Foundation. Crawford was also in 2021 named the National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist in Strings.

At age 15, Crawford was accepted into the legendary Curtis Institute of Music to study with Peter Wiley and Carter Brey and went on to complete an Artist Diploma at the Manhattan School of Music with Philippe Muller, a Master of Music at The Juilliard School with Joel Krosnick, and pursue further study in Chicago with Hans Jørgen Jensen. He has given concerts in 25 states as well as Brazil, Canada, Costa Rica, France, Germany, Mexico, and Switzerland at venues such as The International Concert Series of the Louvre in Paris, Volkswagen's Die Gläsern Manufaktur in Dresden, and the inaugural season of the Tippet Rise Arts Center in Montana. Crawford gave his solo debut with the Philadelphia Orchestra as First Prize Winner of the orchestra's Greenfield Competition and has performed Beethoven Triple Concerto with the Memphis Symphony, Dvorak and Gulda Cello Concertos with the Shreveport Symphony, and Haydn's C Major Cello Concerto with the Highland Park Strings.

While in Chicago, Crawford appeared on WFMT's Impromptu series and toured extensively with Steinway artist and pianist Victor Santiago Asuncion. He has appeared twice with Christopher O'Riley on National Public Radio's From the Top. An advocate for the importance of social media, Crawford commands a strong Instagram presence, attracting tens of thousands of viewers to his project #The1000DayJourney, where he films artistic cinematic videos daily from his practice and performances for over 55,000 followers (@cellocrawford) to give a glimpse into the working process of a musician, recently passing the 1000-day mark.

Crawford's numerous competition prizes also include Grand Prize and First Prize Cellist at the 2015 American String Teachers National Solo Competition, the Lynn Harrell Competition of the Dallas Symphony, the Hudson Valley Competition, and the Kingsville International Competition. He has competed in the Tchaikovsky and Queen Elisabeth competitions and was accepted at the prestigious Verbier Academy in Switzerland for study under the tutelage of Ralph Kirshbaum and Torleif Thedeen.

Crawford has been a fellow at Music from Angel Fire in New Mexico, the National Arts Centre's Zukerman Young Artist Program in Canada, The Fontainebleau School in France, and the Perlman Chamber Music Program. He was invited to perform at Boston's French Cultural Museum in a chamber music concert with Boston Symphony concertmaster Malcolm Lowe, Curtis President Roberto Diaz, and members of the Borromeo Quartet, and was the only student performer on a tour series to Costa Rica, Mexico, and Brazil, collaborating with artists Soovin Kim, Roberto Diaz, and Jason Vieaux as part of Curtis on Tour. While a student at Curtis, Crawford's recital performances were broadcast on WHYY public television in Philadelphia. He was interviewed for the recently released documentary Maestro about conductor Paavo Järvi, and is also interviewed and quoted in Dan Coyle's The Talent Code by Dan Coyle, a bestselling book about the science and neurology behind skill development.

Crawford is from a musical family and performs on a rare 200-year old European cello smuggled out of Austria by his grandfather, Dr. Robert Popper, who evaded Kristallnacht in 1938. He also performs on a fine French bow by the revolutionary bowmaker Tourte "L'Ainé" from 1790. Before attending Curtis, Crawford studied with concert cellist Andres Diaz of Southern Methodist University. In addition to music, he enjoys reading about astrophysics, running, performing magic tricks, and photography.

DR. GEORGE KECK

George Keck is Professor Emeritus of Music, former Chair of the Division of Music, and former Chair of the Department of History and Literature at Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas, where he served as Addie Mae Maddox Professor. He also served as chair of the Department of Music at the University of Arkansas Little Rock. Dr. Keck was awarded the Ph.D. degree in Musicology from the University of Iowa, and the Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees in

piano performance from the University of Arkansas. He completed post-doctoral studies at Harvard University and Princeton University.

Keck is the author of *Francis Poulenc: A Bio-Bibliography* and *Feel the Spirit: Studies in Nineteenth-Century Afro-American Music.* He is a former editor of the Society for American Music Bulletin. Dr. Keck is a frequent lecturer on French music, the composer Francis Poulenc, and nineteenth-century American music.

Dr. Keck holds several positions in the National Federation of Music Clubs as Arkansas Board Representative, chairman of the Archives Committee, chairman of the Ellis Competition for Duo Pianists, member of the Headquarters Committee, and designated chairman of the Wendell Irish Viola Award. He is a member of the Board of Arkansas Federation of Music Clubs and Young Artist Presentation Chairman.



MICHAEL VASCONES

Michael Vascones was born in 1998 in Queens, New York. Inspired by watching his father play, Michael began playing guitar at the age of twelve. At fourteen, he attended Juilliard Music Advancement Program where he studied with Bokyung Byun for two years.



He has also worked with several professional, collegiate, high school, and community ensembles throughout the world.

Mr. Bodony earned a bachelor's degree in both religious studies and trombone performance from DePauw University in 2008. He later received a master's degree in trombone performance from Indiana University in 2011, where his primary teachers were Jim Beckel and Carl Lenthe, respectively. Mr. Bodony also pursued conducting studies at the St. Petersburg Conservatory (Russia) and Indiana University. His primary conducting teachers include Arthur Fagen, Leonid Korchmar, and Kirk Trevor.

As a trombonist, Mr. Bodony has frequently performed with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra and can be heard playing 2nd trombone on two album releases under the Telarc label, conducted by Krzysztof Urbański and Jun Märkl, respectively.

In 2013, Mr. Bodony was honored with the Beckmann Emerging Artist Award given by the Arts Council of Indianapolis to a young professional with exceptional talent and promise in a given field.



ELLIS DUO

Pianists Sylvia Hong and Michael Rector began performing together as a duo shortly after being married in 2011. They have played recitals at the Kennedy Center in Washington and the Lotte Concert Hall in Seoul. In April 2014, they toured in Eastern Europe, performing with the Georgian Sinfonietta and Black

Sea Symphony. Highlights of their numerous tours in Korea include playing two sold-out concerts on the same day in Busan, and an invitation to perform with the orchestra in the Olympic city of Gangneung during the 2018 winter games. Avid proponents of American music, Sylvia and Michael presented a lecture-recital on the music of Morton Feldman at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Graz, Austria, in 2019. Following extensive research at the Library of Congress, their current project is a recital program and recording of rediscovered 19th-century American compositions for four hands.

Sylvia Hong is known to audiences worldwide as a pianist of imagination and virtuosity. As a concerto soloist, Sylvia has played in Korea with the KBS Orchestra, Mokpo Symphony, Busan Symphony and Suwon Symphony. In her native United States, she has performed with the Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic and Mt. Vernon Symphony Orchestra. She made her debut in the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall at the age of 16 as the 1st prize winner of the National Russian Competition. Sylvia's three commercial recordings, all live performances, were produced by the Far East Broadcasting Corporation. She was the Korea Times "Musician of the Year" for 2012. Sylvia credits much of her success to her principal teachers-Lydia Frumkin of Oberlin Conservatory, Lee Kum-Sing of the Vancouver Academy of Music, and Benjamin Pasternack of the Peabody Conservatory where she received her Performer's Diploma in 2012. She is currently Associate Lecture at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay.

Michael graduated from the doctoral program at Manhattan School of Music in 2012, where his teacher was Philip Kawin. He also earned a bachelor's degree from Oberlin College, where he majored in comparative literature. Michael has presented lecture-recitals and masterclasses both at home and abroad, including at China Conservatory in Beijing, the University of Kassel in Germany, and numerous universities and music schools in Korea. His academic research focuses on performance practice and style change, with forthcoming articles in the journals *Empirical Musicology Review* and *Perspectives of New Music*. He has also written about piano pedagogy for *American Music Teacher*, *Clavier Companion*, and the *MTNA e-Journal*. He is currently Associate Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay.

CONVENTION RULES

Registration

- 1. All convention attendees are required to register.
- 2. Admission to all meetings and functions requires presentation of a proper badge.

Voting

- 1. At registration, all who have voting privileges will receive a voting credential.
- 2. The credential must be displayed for a vote to be counted.

Attendance

- All official delegates are expected to attend meetings and to be on time for the beginning of all sessions.
- 2. If a delegate must be absent from the meeting, his/her credential may be given to his/her registered alternate.



MEETINGS

Floor Privilege

- 1. All members of the Federation have the privilege of discussion.
- 2. Delegates are to be recognized before non-delegates.
- 3. Floor privileges may be accorded a visitor by a majority vote.
- 4. A member wishing to speak should rise, address the chair, and identify himself/herself by name state and club affiliation.
- 5. Each speaker has a two-minute time limit.
- 6. There will be a timekeeper for all meetings, the timekeeper's signal is to be recognized and obeyed. If time is called, the speaker may finish the sentence before relinguishing the floor.

Motions

- 1. Only delegates are entitled to make motions.
- 2. The voting credential is required for a vote to be counted.
- 3. Any speaker must announce whether he/she is speaking for or against the motion.
- 4. No person may speak more than twice to the same motion except the maker of the motion.
- 5. No person may be recognized to speak a second time when there are others wishing to speak for the first time.
- 6. Motions are to be in writing and should be handed to the secretary before the vote is taken.

Reports

- 1. Reports are due at the time set in the call. Reports will be available on CD and in hardcopy at the registration desk.
- 2. Recommendations for action are to be in the hand of the secretary and the president at least 12 hours before the scheduled presentation time.
- 3. All participants are to address only the subject at hand and are to strictly observe the time limit.
- 4. No awards, except those approved by the President, may be presented at the business meetings or general sessions.

Programs/Concerts

- 1. Introductions are to be limited to one minute and should contain only current information. Additional biographical data will be included in the meeting program.
- 2. Programs are to proceed according to the approved, printed program for each individual concert.
- 3. No interruptions are permitted during the program.

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


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
