Vivace is ready for everyone!

We are nearing the home stretch! This project was started at our NFMC Conference in 2008 with the proposal to build an online Festival Management System. Many many hours of volunteer service have gone into this project with testing and implementation. Our goal is to have the transition complete with all Festival Areas using *Vivace* for the 2022-2023 Festival year.

If you have not yet seen what *Vivace* can do, we recommend the overview video. It will take about 10 minute of your time and is a great introduction. Here is the link. https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=QXAeX9eyvNA&feature=youtu.be

What if our Area has not started using Vivace?

All Festival areas will be required to use *Vivace* for Federation Festivals beginning in the fall of 2022. We have many people training and willing to help those areas who have not yet started, and we are all committed to help the remaining areas prepare to use *Vivace*. The initial effort is definitely worth it because of the time and effort saved by using *Vivace*. The registration process catches any teacher errors. Reports are accurate and completed with the click of a button. After Festival reporting is quick and easy once the ratings have been entered. Students transferring to a different teacher have the Festival history transferred with ease so that the new teacher knows exactly what the student has done with Festivals in previous years. These are just a few of the benefits!

In order to start the process, an application needs to be submitted by either the State or the Area. We know there will be a big push during the summer with the areas still needing to be onboarded, so we recommend that you submit your application as soon as possible. For everyone's benefit, we will manage the number of new areas who are admitted at any given time so that the support team will be able to provide help in a timely manner.

What is the process for onboarding into Vivace?

The process includes:

- 1. Requesting a project application by emailing: festivals@nfmc-music.org
- 2. Submitting the completed application.
- Receiving the Project Education Guide and carefully studying the process outlined.
- 4. Viewing the orientation webinar. Here is the link: https://www.youtube. com/watch?v=eEWuOYErI2I

- 5. Selecting the method of entering the historical data: manual entry or import.
- 6. Having a National Administrator set an appointment with your two Festival Area Admins to grant them access so they can begin the manual entry process OR begin the process of preparing data for import.

Process to prepare data for Vivace

Since we have a variety of "starting points" for various Festival Areas, we created the *Vivace* Project Education Guide for Areas that want to start using the system. Basically, there will be two approaches:

- 1. Manual Entry of history: This will take lots of volunteer hours but will involve very little cost. There will be help materials as well as Regional and National project coaches available to help you through the process.
- 2. One Time Import of history: This will take time to prepare and will involve some cost to the local area to prepare and import their history. Those areas choosing this process will be more limited in number, as we must rely on the developer's time to review and approve each import file.

NFMC FESTIVALS CHAIR A Vision into the Future

Hello to all! I'm very honored to be the new National Festivals Chair. I'm looking forward to working with all the Festival Chairs in moving the Festivals program forward into the future. What does that vision look like? What could we accomplish if resources, personnel, or time were no object? Please spend some time thinking about this for your studio, your area, your state (whatever level of involvement you have). Then grab a piece of paper (or use a digital tool) and write it down. Writing down your goals greatly improves the chances of success, and it's an easy thing to do. As I tell my students, "Always do the easy things!" ©

Here are some questions you might want to ponder:

- How can we get more members? Every Festival area is unique, but one thing that we can all do is to invite a friend to a meeting so they can get to know the wonderful people in our clubs. Building relationships and a sense of community will go far in helping everything else run smoothly. Reach out to everyone who is a musician, music teacher, or music lover. The more the merrier! Federation is unique in that we have a place for *everyone* who loves music. Get people involved so that they have ownership in the organization and then watch the wonderful things that will happen.
- How can we get more Festival entries? One basic way is to encourage students to do more than one event. There's more to Festival than just the solo events. Dow, I know what you're thinking... "It's all I can do to get their solos ready. The kids are so busy, they don't have time for yet one more thing." Believe me, I understand. But it's possible to incorporate the pieces they are *already practicing* for their lessons to be used for Festival. What am

I talking about? Well, for example, many lesson and performance/ repertoire books utilize American folk or patriotic songs. If a student learns a folk song as part of their lesson, they just need to learn one more from the required list and then-boom! —they have their pieces ready for the American Patriotic and Folk Song Event. (Plus, APFS pieces do not need to be memorized, so that can shorten the preparation time.) Or, do your students learn Christmas carols/ holiday music? If so, there's a piece that can potentially be used for the Hymn Playing or Sacred Music Piano Solo event. Or how about scales, arpeggios, and chords? Are your students learning them? Those can be performed in the Improvisation event. Would you consider helping your students get a trophy in one of these events? Think about those big smiles when they have realized their accomplishments.

• Now it's not all about getting, it's also about giving, so...**How can we give back to our community?** We always need to be thinking about giving out the blessings that we have received so that we don't grow stagnant. Think about water...flowing, running water remains fresh. Water that just stands around gets scummy and gross. Keep your music flowing into your community to bring that life-giving force spreading. What corner of your world might be blessed by a program from your club or your students?

I want to encourage all of you to be bold and daring in your vision. Share your vision with others. Work towards its completion. If we all do a little bit, that will add up to an amazing difference. Do all that you can to fulfill the Federation Collect's words:....to bring the spiritualizing force of music to the inner life of our nation. We desperately need it.

1ST PLACE: Natalie Chow New Jersey

Natalie Chow is a 16-year-old pianist from Livingston, New Jersey, who has been under the tutelage of concert pianist Beatrice Long for the past four years. Natalie established herself early as a young artist through a myriad of performances and competitions. At the age of six, she was selected by audition to perform in

the JCC Sylvia and Jacob Handler Master Class with Jonathan Feldman and made her Carnegie Hall debut at age seven. Hailed by judges in the Marilyn Caldwell Piano Solo Award for her "solid techniques, stylistic interpretations, mature musicianship and talent well above her age," Natalie is the second prize winner of the American Prize Piano Solo. Her other honors in the year 2021 include National YoungArts Winner in Classical Music, top prize winners in the Dubois Piano Competition, the Chopin International Piano Competition Hartford CT, and the Canadian International Music Competition. Natalie has actively participated in NFMC activities: she was the winner of the 2020 Thelma Byrum Award and the First Prize winner of the 2020 Ulrich Whitehurst Piano Solo Award. She was also the First Prize winner of the NJFMC piano competition in the year 2018, 2019, and 2020. Natalie has performed as a soloist at numerous recital halls such as Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall, Alice Tully Hall at Lincoln Center, New Jersey Performing Arts Center, New York Merkin Hall, and Grace Rainey Rogers Auditorium at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Additionally, she was selected to perform in masterclasses given by Victor Rosenbaum, Melvin Chen, Enrique Graf, and Jeffrey Biegel. As a complement to her musical ventures, Natalie enjoys being an active volunteer in the local community and has performed in several senior homes. During the pandemic, she participated in an online fundraising concert in support of Key2Sucess - a non-profit organization that provides music lessons and instruments to inner-city students in Newark. Furthermore, Natalie is the founder of Harmony of Music, an organization that provides virtual music concerts to senior residents in nursing homes and assisted living facilities to spread love and joy, promote health and emotional support and reduce isolation. 2ND PLACE: Cory Wu Ohio

Cory Wu is a 16 year old pianist and a junior at Columbus Academy. He has studied piano with Kathleen Sadoff since 2012 and also with Nina Polonsky since 2020. He has won 1st place at numerous piano competitions and festivals, including the 2020 Piano League PianoStar International Piano Competition,

2019 Ohio State MTNA, 2019 Carmel Klavier Concerto Competition, 2020 MTNA Eastern Central Division Duet, Steinway competition, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra's Young Music Concerto Competition and many state competitions. In 2019, Cory made his debut with the New Albany Symphony Orchestra performing Saint-Saën's Piano Concerto No. 2 in G minor after winning the NASO Student Concerto Competition. In addition, Cory has participated in other various national and international music events such as the David D. Dubois International Piano Competition Finals, the StayHome International Piano Competition, the NOMEA International Piano Competition, the 2021 MTNA National Duet Finals, the International Chamber Music Ensemble Competition of the Chamber Music Foundation of New England, and the Ronald Sachs International Music Competition. Dmitrii Shaposhnikov is a 16-year-old pianist born in Moscow, Russia. He moved to Omaha, NE with his mother, father, and younger sister Arina in November 2013. In Moscow, Dmitrii was on the swim team where he participated on the Olympic Reserve Team for Paralympic swimmers.

Dmitrii has shown a high aptitude for music since he was small child. He first demonstrated his musical gift as toddler when he began to play piano to children's songs by ear. He received his first piano on his 4th birthday and has excelled by leaps and bounds ever since.

1ST PLACE Jonathan Okseniuk Arizona

Jonathan Okseniuk, 14, studies violin with Jing Zeng. Since the age of four, Jonathan has had opportunities

to perform solos with various orchestras. At the age of 10 he had the privilege of making his solo debut with the West Valley Symphony, and two years later, returned with them to perform a major violin concerto.

Earlier this year, Jonathan was named second place laureate in the Junior Division of the 2021 Sphinx Competition. Last year, he was named the national winner of the 2020 Music Teachers National Association (MTNA), Junior Performance Strings Competition and took first place in the 2020 Phoenix Youth Symphony's Young Musicians Competition in the Upper String Category Junior Division. He has also placed first in the 2019 Arizona Musicfest Young Musicians Competition Division I, the Junior Category of the 2018 Arizona American String Teachers Association State Solo Competition, and the 2018 Arizona MTNA Junior Strings Competition. He was also the recipient of the 2019 NFMC Gladys Comstock Award.

Over the past five years, Jonathan has played as both concertmaster and principal second violinist of local youth orchestras, and currently is the assistant concertmaster of the Phoenix Youth Symphony Orchestra.

To share his gift of music, Jonathan donates his talent to the community by playing the violin and piano at nursing homes, and by participating in the worship band at his church. Although he aspires to become a professional violinist, Jonathan enjoys mountain biking and playing sports with friends.



2ND PLACE Nicholas Boettcher

Nicholas Boettcher, 16, studies double bass with Andy Anderson. He studies music with

Sooka Wang. Previously, he studied cello with Sally Gross. Nicholas was named a National YoungArts Foundation Winner for 2020. He was a finalist in the Chicago Symphony Orchestra's Young Artist Competition, and soloed with the Chicago Civic Orchestra in March, 2020. He is to solo with Chicago's Grant Park Orchestra for their July 4th concert. Later in 2020, Nicholas will solo with DuPage Symphony Orchestra and Northern Illinois University's Sinfonia Orchestra. Last fall, Nicholas soloed at Chicago Symphony's Orchestra Hall with the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra. Last summer he was a semifinalist at the International Society of Bassists Performance Competition. Nicholas also performed with the Chicago Philharmonic as the youngest musician to have ever been selected for its Spotlight program. He has played with the Chicago Sinfonietta, the Wheaton College Symphony Orchestra and was selected to play in the Chicago Youth in Music program, directed by Riccardo Muti.

Nicholas won first place at the DuPage Symphony Orchestra's Young Artists Auditions, the Illinois American String Teachers Association Competition, NIU's Sinfonia Orchestra's Concerto Competition, and the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra's Concerto Competition. He also won the Naperville North High School Concerto Competition and soloed with their orchestra. Nicholas is a three-time first place winner of the CYSO's Orchestral Excerpt Competition, and he also won first place in the Elsie Sterrenberg String Scholarship Competition, the Glen Ellyn-Wheaton Music Club Scholarship Competition, and the American Fine Arts Festival International Concerto Competition, performing at Carnegie Hall's Weill Hall.

Nicholas has performed in masterclasses for Joel Braun, Jeff Bradetich, Kristen Bruya, Rachel Calin, Michael Cameron, Ian Hallas, Alexander Hanna, Michael Hovnanian, Robert Kassinger, Jon McCullough-Benner, Kurt Muroki, Kate Nettleman, Don Palma, Andrew Raciti, Hal Robinson, and James VanDemark.

In 8th grade, Nicholas created The No Repeats Project, a 501(c)(3) organization, in which young musicians work with teens who are incarcerated. In 2019, he received a School District 203 Mission Makers award for his program, and this year, Nicholas received the 2020 President's Volunteer Service Award. No *Repeats* provides an opportunity for young musicians to expand the impact of their music beyond performance. The program introduces different musical genres to the teens at the youth centers and provides opportunities to learn how to play instruments and to see music performances in and out of the centers. The No *Repeats Project* uses the transformative power of music to try to reduce the risk of re-entry into the criminal justice system - No Repeats!

Nicholas serves as a principal bassist of the CYSO, its Classical Orchestra Repertory Ensemble, and the Naperville North High School Orchestra and plays with its Jazz Ensemble. He has toured central Europe, Scandinavia, and Russia with the CYSO. These past summers Nicholas attended the International Bassist Society's Convention, Curtis Summerfest, Orford Musique Acadamie, and Bowdoin International Music Festival studying with Hal Robinson, Don Palma, and Kurt Muroki, respectively. This summer he is to attend the Double Bass Workshop at Boston University's Tanglewood Institute, the Atlantic Music Festival, and Domaine Forget. In addition to music, Nicholas also enjoys a good steak!

A multi-faceted performer with unique communicative abilities, **MingHuan Xu** has delighted audiences with her passion, effortless technique, sensitivity and charisma. Her versatility allows her to perform an eclectic mix of musical styles ranging from the standard works to avant-garde contemporary repertoire. She has performed extensively as a concerto soloist, duo-recitalist and chamber musician throughout five continents.

Ms. Xu's latest recital and chamber music performances have brought her to prominent American venues including Carnegie-Weill Recital Hall, Merkin Hall, Symphony Space, the Library of Congress and the Smithsonian Institute in Washington D.C. Her Carnegie Hall debut was featured on Voice of America, a weekly television show viewed by millions of people in China, Taiwan and Hong Kong. In 2010 she performed recitals and taught master classes in China: at the Shenyang Conservatory of Music, the Sichuan Conservatory of Music, and the Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing. Her South American debut in 2006 brought her to the Festival Musica Nova in Brazil and the Festival Encuentros in Argentina. Her numerous performances have included live radio broadcasts on National Public Radio (NPR), WFMT (Chicago) and CBC (Canada) Radio.

Pianist **Winston Choi** is the Head of the Piano Program at Roosevelt University's Chicago College of Performing Arts. In 1789, the first known reference to music therapy was written in an article called "Music Physically Considered". For years after that, music therapy was scarcely written about until the early nineteen-hundreds when it began to gain popularity. Research began to develop, and more and more people began to be interested in music therapy. Today it is widely known as an evidence-based practice for health benefits. Music is used to heal broken minds, reduce stress and anxiety, and help relieve symptoms of various other disorders including schizophrenia. This shows how powerful music can be. It can distract the mind, slow down the rhythms of your body, and influence your mood in turn changing behavior.

When you think of music, you might not think of protests, but music protests have inspired many generations for change. No matter what is being protested, there is a song to represent it. It brings people together in a peaceful way. Toward the end of 1980, Estonia was still under control of the Soviet Union, songs and hymns were forbidden. Over 300,000 people -a quarter of Estonia's population - gathered to sing national songs and hear independence leaders speak at the "Song of Estonia" festival in 1988. Imagine – nineteen students, ages fourteen through eighteen (and one aged twenty-one) at a camp in Wisconsin. Fifteen are meeting in person, four are virtual. Young musicians who have been isolated for a year and a half from the only peers who understand them and their passion. Young musicians who would learn together, create together, perform together, play together and within one week, become a family. Joy!

This all happened at the Junior Composers Institute / Composers On-line Institute (JCI/COI), sponsored by the North Central region of NFMC held at the University of Wisconsin, River Falls in July. In its twenty-first year and at a new location, JCI was brilliantly re-visioned and re-formatted with spectacular results.

The goal of the institute was to focus attention in a short, intensive span of time to

- > Generate rich and exciting musical ideas
- > Capture those ideas in notation or a recording
 - > **Enhance** & improve on those ideas
 - > **Share** the music with an audience
 - > **Discover** new skills and musical literacies

Here were some of the exciting innovations to accomplish these goals:

- **1.** This was a hybrid experience. While most students were on campus, students brought their computers to the classroom and all sessions were on zoom so that off-campus students could feel as if they were also a part of the camp.
- 2. Rather than the traditional assigned theory classes going on simultaneously, students chose from a "menu" of classes arranged around the theme WWXD (What Would X Do?). For example, Sarah Miller followed a theme of counterpoint what would Bach do (Goldberg Variations)?; what would Pérotin do (Viderunt)?; what would de Vitry do (Roman de Fauvel)? What would Purcell do (Dido and Aeneus); canons and the writing of the annual camp canon; theory, history, musicology everything wrapped into one package. Randall Davidson, Jordyn Davis and Eric Radloff had similar integrated curricula that were focused on their areas of interest and expertise. The students had to pick a minimum of three classes a day from this delicious menu but were allowed to gorge on more if they chose, and many students did. And pulling everything together was Mary Kate Hines.
- **3.** There was an expanded use of DAWs (digital audio workstation) to create musical outcomes. The final program included compositions played live by students and staff, DAW presentations, and hybrids.
- **4.** There were daily salons presented on zoom by composers of different genres from coast to coast who spoke about their personal creative processes.
- **5.** To encourage the bonding of the young composers, there was time for special activities off campus trips to escape campus food, ping pong and its derivative made up by the students ring rong (musical chairs ping pong), etc.



The experience of the students before the camp ranged from nothing formal ever written to having composed twelve symphonies and working on an opera, yet the kids said that no one ever felt excluded or inferior.

The totality of the experience had the entire staff in tears. Sarah summed up the feelings of the staff when she said, "You are the most amazing group. You have such a beautiful dynamic between you. I have never witnessed this before and it makes me hopeful for the future."

GROWING UP "FLATAU" Memories from Carole Flatau's children

This is about Carole. This is about what being in a musical family with Carole as our mother was like. Looking back is eye-opening and makes us all appreciate her life and legacy.

She didn't grow up in a musical family. Her father had played the harmonica, but he died when she was in grade school. Grandma refused to pay for piano lessons when she asked. Grandma told her that she'd already wasted money paying for lessons for her older sisters

and they hadn't practiced, so she wasn't going to pay for Mom. Carole wasn't deterred; she saved her money by pulling weeds, babysitting, and working in a grocery store and paid for them herself. Perseverance was an enduring character trait throughout her life.

As a young mother in the 1950's, Carole was the typical "Leave it to Beaver" Mom. At least it was until Mom started going to Fargo for piano workshops. A few piano students in a little house grew to a larger class in the house on 3rd Ave. where the sign on the side door said "THIS ONE". A few music store-sponsored workshops she attended became networking before the term was ever used.

At workshops, she met other piano teachers with similar goals and she saw a need to educate the importance of music for everyone, especially young children. She was a charter member of the FMMTNA and got involved at the state level. She helped form the Valley City MTNA chapter.

Her life was changed forever when she attended her first National Music Convention. She got a fire of enthusiasm that erupted and never went out. Sometimes it dimmed, but only until she could recharge at another convention. As her family, we knew she was involved with projects that took her more places, added more piles of lists and papers on the dining room table, but we only knew her as our mother; a piano teacher, church musician and town pianist for various functions, everything from beauty pageants to horse shows.

We never saw her as a national powerhouse of music...a promoter of music education with an emphasis on folk music the last big chapter in her life. We didn't realize the scope of her national accomplishments for a long time. We WERE aware of her impact in our town and state. She was just "Mom".

That's not to say we were blind to her enthusiasm. We were immersed in music at an early age with her strong encouragement. One of my earliest memories was when brother Neil and I sang "Let's Get Together" for a Rotary dinner. We had matching outfits: mine was a plaid dress and Neil had a plaid vest and red bow tie. The four of us kids all grew up playing in band, singing in choirs and played piano.

Christmas Parties were a major part of our childhoods. Piano recitals were held in the living room with family sitting in rows in the living and dining room while students sat in the fireplace room and on the stairs to the 2nd floor. All students would play a piece and when all had played, we would gather around the piano and each student, from beginner to advanced, would play a Christmas Carol for everyone to sing along. (This was brother Alan's favorite memory.) While the sing-along was happening, the refreshments were brought out. Mom made the best divinity and fudge! Grandma made her egg coffee.

The parties are still remembered fondly, as were the biannual ensemble recitals held in the college music auditorium. We'd have rehearsals at the college the day before and it was a BIG DEAL.





With our mother as our piano teacher, our lessons were often switched for make-up lessons for her students. My brothers didn't mind. Sister Carrie, on the other hand, treasured her one-on-one time with her piano instructor. Carrie was precocious and one time she put on Mom's Easter hat and shoes, rang the front door bell. When Mom answered it, Carrie announced, "Good day, Mrs. Flatau, I'm Mrs. Flower and I'm here for my piano lesson." From that day on, Carrie's time was hers only.

Music was always in our house. If it wasn't coming from the piano in the living room or studio, it was coming from the radio in the dining room where most of us could hear it. MPR (Minnesota Public Radio classics) was on whenever there was a lull. Mom would often call out to the household, "What period (of music) is this piece?" We all learned the periods of music and would shout our answer down the stairs or from another room.

We lived one block away from the Jr. Sr. High School and often came home for lunch. One day, Carrie had an appointment and needed Mom to write an excuse to get out of school. Carrie was in another room and didn't see Mom writing. Mom wanted to know which class Carrie was going to miss and called out, "Which period?" To which Carrie answered, "Baroque!" Musical family indeed.

One big advantage we Flatau kids had was when Mom and Dad were part of the promotion of the Community Concert Association series. The perk was having the artists come to our house for a reception after the concerts. Mom kept a guest book for years and it is exciting to see the names who came to our Valley City, North Dakota house. Some artists became life-long friends. The duo pianists, Stecher and Horowitz came and we saw them in other cities through the country.

One of my favorite stories is when the classic guitarist, Christopher Parkening, came to town. He was just beginning his career (he had studied under Andre Segovia.) He got to town and came to dinner. We had pork chops and he asked if he could eat with his hands. Of course he could! Pork chops and drumsticks are meant to be eaten that way. There were a lot of good memories attached to Community Concerts.

As I said before, we saw Carole as 'Mom'. She really compartmentalized her family life with her career. She didn't brag or put on airs. We often didn't hear of where she had been or what part she had in the conventions or meetings. Through the years, Carrie and I went with her once in a while and we were both proud of how she was received and amazed at the people she knew and corresponded with, but, we were not privy to many of her business dealings. We know that she was always humbled by the fact that she was a small town piano teacher and was blessed by the opportunities she received.

I only got a glimpse of her professional life when I started cleaning out her files after she fell and broke her hip. The more I cleared out, the more I realized how much she had accomplished. She was truly a national treasure and we were lucky to have her as our Mom.

Encouraging Students to Practice Music Lessons

By now we all know that playing an instrument is not only fun and an emotional outlet, but for young people it helps with language, reading, math and motor skills. And with Suzuki training, memory skills. As adults, practicing will keep your brain active and help stave off Alzheimer's Disease. In Dr. Anita Collins' 5 minute Ted Talk video, "How Playing a Musical Instrument Benefits Your Brain", she states that playing an instrument uses more of your brain than any other art or than any sport. So, practicing an instrument is also HEALTHY!

Passion for Practice



How will we get more people practicing? Author of 2 books to encourage practicing, Becky Chaffee, says "A local music teacher called me after reading *Passion For Practice With Musings From Music Masters* to say 'I sat down with a bowl of soup and your book. I couldn't get up until I finished the

book because I loved it so much. I can't imagine that anyone could read this book and not want to practice!' That is the ultimate compliment." If empowering students with the skill to make practicing their own, encouraging a new attitude towards practicing, people will want to do it as a fun challenge. The better one gets at playing an instrument, the more fun it is. Likewise, the better one gets at practicing, understanding how to solve challenges on their own, the more fun they will have. Maybe we should think of another name for practicing.

Likewise again, the better at music one gets, the better you want to get. As you improve, you are more likely to hire a private teacher to venture into more difficult music challenges. So, Ms. Chaffee's recent book, *Passion For Practice...*, tries to get people out of the "have to practice" mindset, where it's easy to think you need to put in your practice hours (whether for yourself or whether your mother is making you), and waste your own

time with uninspired, unproductive practice. Ms. Chaffee is trying to light up our desire to want to solve playing challenges in the practice room on our own with tools that many people take a lifetime to acquire.

Ms. Chaffee had the idea of expressing practice tips visually in her paintings with bright colors and humor. The whimsical paintings in her books are her unique contribution to music education. You can purchase her books on her website with other music gifts created by Ms. Chaffee or on Amazon. Her website is www.MusicTeacherGifts.com. She initially put her paintings on note cards with the practice tips on the back, also selling her work as prints and originals. Her work is for sale in symphony gift shops across the country from San Francisco to Nashville and the Brevard Music Center.

To inspire and empower music students to practice, Ms. Chaffee explains the reasons why we practice various ways. For example, instead of having a student roll their eyes while practicing, they know why they might repeat a section over and over before moving on after a mistake. Ms. Chaffee says Practicing music well is like an approach to life. How you think about doing something is just as important as doing the think itself. When you practice, what are you doing? You are teaching your brain. For example, if you are playing, and make a mistake, you need to stop playing immediately and play the correct notes repeatedly. Your brain is a creature of habit. When you learn something, neural connections are made in the brain, and you want the connections to be made for the right notes! In this way, she explains why you take a certain practice approach, which is enabling to the practicing student.

COMPETITION AND AWARDS (C&A) CHART

The C&A Chart may be downloaded from nfmc-music.org or ordered from NFMC Headquarters, 1646 Smith Valley Rd. Greenwood IN 46142. The Chart includes only endowed NFMC Awards. Check Individual State Federation websites for possible additional awards.

APPLICATION FORMS, INFORMATION AND SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Award requirements and application forms are available on the NFMC website, nfmc-music.org, or contact the Chair of the specific award.

All NFMC award applications must be submitted online by uploading them to the NFMC website.

U.S. CITIZENSHIP REQUIREMENT

Applicants for individual awards must be native-born/naturalized U.S. citizens. (Exceptions: Lynn Freeman Olson Composition, Lynn Freeman Olson Piano Pedagogy Award, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award and International Music Camp – at least 50% of IMC award recipients must be U.S. citizens.)

NFMC MEMBERSHIP

Applicants must be NFMC members either by individual, organizational or associate group affiliation before applications are accepted. (Exceptions: Young Artist Awards, Ellis Piano Duo Awards, National Music Week Essay, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award, Centennial Chamber Music Commendation, Summer Music Center Awards, and the three Armed Forces Awards.) Application forms include specific membership information.

Note: In competitions requiring NFMC membership, applicants must hold membership in the division in which the competition is listed (e.g. Junior entrants must be members of the Junior Division; Student entrants of the Student/Collegiate Division, etc.)

FIRST PLACE WINNER LIMITATIONS

- No individual may enter, in the same year, competitions in multiple divisions even if they hold membership in more than one division.
- No first place winner of an individual NFMC award listed in the C&A Chart is eligible to compete again for the same award.
 (Exceptions: NFMC Veterans Awards where entrants may win first place awards multiple times but not consecutively, and the Jr. Composers competition in which first place winners may compete in a different category but not the same category.)
- First place winners of Arts and American Music Division monetary awards may win first place multiple times, but not consecutively. (Exception: National Music Week Essay Contest)
