



It is actually Thanksgiving Day as I write this to you finding a quiet corner in my mother's home with mouth-watering aromas tempting me to sneak a taste. Whether you read this now or any other day, similar memories may bring a smile to you including thanks for all our blessings.

It takes hundreds of Federation volunteers at the national, state, and local levels to provide the support we need to do all things Federation: Awards, Festivals, Music Club Magazine, Junior Keynotes, and membership support is year-round.

As you read this, Festival committees and Junior Award chairs are completing their events and preparing reports to share the news of the extraordinary juniors' successes. However, no fear, they are also adding compositions for our younger juniors as well who are excited to join their studio mates in Festival participation.

Please join me in thanking these dedicated members who volunteer 24/7 providing you with technical support and ongoing education. Behind the scenes, they are making your suggestions a reality as the Vivace software continues to evolve.

To date, 6200 teachers with nearly 99,000 students are onboarded using Vivace to manage their Festivals. Over 5,000 Festivals successfully reported from 56 U.S. states and territories. More than 4200 composers with over 14,000 compositions available by 515 publishers add a vast variety of literature available to us.

Finally, looking ahead, I hope you have solidified your plans to attend the NFMC Biennial Convention in Norfolk, Virginia June 12-17, 2023. The Junior Division is already hard at work with plans to meet with you there. Your input continues to be important to us as we work with you to help Federation be the best philanthropic nonprofit organization promoting and supporting American music, performing artists, and music educators.

Online Festival Management

Many areas are seasoned and experienced in using Vivace for all things to do with Festival Management. If your area is not yet familiar with some of this functionality, check the Support Center.

TEACHERS:

The registration process is easy, and *Vivace* will help you make sure your registrations are acceptable. Those who have used *Vivace* for several years like to do the registration as soon as repertoire is selected to make sure everything is in order. Changes can be made by the teacher at any time up until registration closes and the approval process begins. Some of the things that can cause frustration are:

- A composer that cannot be located in Vivace. Remember, search with the most unique information, and the less information, the better the search. Opus numbers work well for concerti. Watch for diacritics: EXAMPLE - search for Burgmüller with Burgm and stop before the ü if you don't know how to type ü
- A composer that is not yet in Vivace. (The composer can be added, but it won't happen at the last minute.)
- Declared Solo Class must be done by your Area Administrator.
- Forgetting to check the combine or alternate box at the time of registration if this situation applies to the registration. See Bulletin page 11-13.

Each teacher is able to print the **Student History Report** at any time. This report shows all calculations including alternating events like LFO/ Piano Solo; Piano Duet/Trio/Quartet/Duo; Violin Solo and Concerto and combining points like Solo/Concerto or Vocal Art Song/Musical Theater.

For areas where the teacher is to print the rating sheets, the rating sheets are printable from Vivace with all information included.

Note: Do not archive any student who has any activity in Festivals during the current year until the year ends on June 30.



AREA ADMINS:

Registrations in *Vivace* now save you a lot of time because

- Vivace verifies progression at time of registration.
- Vivace checks the Piano Solo composer requirements.
- *Vivace* provides an easy search to make sure the choice repertoire is not in the Bulletin. (Use the magnifying glass icon to make a quick search)
- Vivace makes approval of choice repertoire quick and easy.

Invoicing

Admins send registration confirmation/invoice directly from Vivace once registrations are approved.

Scheduling

- Dates/Rooms/Times can all be customized to fit the design desired by the Festival Area
- Admins send schedule to teachers directly from Vivace.
- There are 16 Reports available for organization of Festival Day.

Ratings Sheets are generated from Vivace. They are completely filled out with all information.

After Festival Reporting:

- Once ratings are certified, the JR 3-9 participation certificates can be printed from Vivace on certificates obtained from NFMC.
- Once ratings are certified, the Consecutive Superior Certificates can be printed from Vivace on certificates obtained from NFMC.
- Federation Cup Report lists all entrants who have earned a Federation Cup in the Festival Year.
- JR 3-3 and 3-4 are generated in .pdf format and can be sent to State Festivals Chair by email.

CREATING OPPORTUNITIES

I am a piano teacher with a 22-member junior roster. Each year as I prepare for a new school year of music lessons, I open up www.nfmc-music.org, click on the link for *PUBLICATIONS*, then scroll to the *JUNIOR DIVISION*, and then scroll down just a little to the *CLUBS* section, find item #JR1-1 *Junior Club Annual Achievement Summary Form*. I then click on **Download PDF**. I peruse the **Club/Member Participation** section, and the **Club Studied** section to use to begin creating the year's Goal Sheet for my students.

We set goals in September so that we will have various activities and projects to work on, as well as music to learn and achieve for performances and Federation Festival. Students in our studio also receive MU\$IC MONEY when they achieve a goal.

Using the Junior Club Annual Achievement Summary, I create several different (and new) goals each year. This year, there is the opportunity to set a goal to participate in the Angie Greer Music in Poetry, the Essay



Contest, Junior Composers Contest, Junior Festival. Last year we all set a collective goal to participate in the Just Jazz! project, and in years past, the goal was to participate in the American Music Junior Club Awards. I would not have even thought to create such goals had I not had this incredible form to stir up my creative juices.

This year I created a whole section of goals called "Music Education." I used the **Club**

Studied section on JR1-1, and there are options for doing reports/presentations on every line item in this section. I'm excited to say that every single student chose more than one of these items to present!

In May of each year, we take stock in all that we have studied and participated in so we can fill out the JR1-1 Summary Form (which can be done online). The students love receiving the certificate and we put them up on our Studio Wall of Fame.

If you'd like to change things up and create excitement in your studio, please take a look at the *Junior Club Annual Achievement Summary Form* JR1-1 and design some new projects, new areas of study, and new ways to get your students involved in some NFMC presentations, contests, and awards. And remember, **submit your completed JR1-1 by June 1st** in order to receive a certificate for which your students will be very proud.





STILLMAN KELLEY COMPETITION

The Stillman Kelley Competition was established in 1938 as a National Award open to eligible Junior members of NFMC. The award was first titled "Edgar Stillman Kelley Scholarship to honor the well-renowned composer and music educator. The Thelma Byrum Piano Award was added to the Stillman Kelley in 1980 in recognition of Thelma Byrum, accomplished musician, wife of Stillman Kelley and the eleventh president of NFMC.

Applicants for this award must be a Junior member of NFMC, native or naturalized citizen of the USA and must not have reached their 19th birthday by March 1st of the audition year. Rules and Procedures information can be found on the NFMC webpage: nfmcmusic.org. Choose the Competition and Awards tab and then the Junior option. The Stillman Kelley competition is open to all instruments and awards include first, second, third and five Regional. The Thelma Byrum Piano Award goes to the top winner in Piano unless that entrant is the Stillman Kelley winner. In that case, the Thelma Byrum award goes to the next highest winner in Piano.

Now is the time for eligible students to prepare for this opportunity. The deadline to submit an application and upload a performance YouTube unlisted link is **March 1, 2023**. 
The Time is NOW

Do you recognize the names of William Primrose, Paul Hindemith, and Kim Kashkashian? All three of these are famous as performers on the viola. All three began study on the violin at an early age but later changed to the viola because they preferred that instrument. All three achieved outstanding careers as professional performers and teachers, and Hindemith as a leading composer of his generation.

Miss Kashkashian began viola study when she attended the Interlochen Arts Academy at the age of 12, and today she is recognized as one of the world's top violists. In 2013 she won a Grammy Award for Best Classical Instrumental Solo.

My hope is that the successes of these great violists will inspire you to reach your potential as a violist, whether your goals are the concert stage, as a member of the viola section of the orchestra, or performing for your own enjoyment. 

WASHINGTON Washington State Junior News





The C&A Chart may be downloaded from nfmc-music.org or ordered from NFMC Headquarters, info@nfmc-music.org. The Chart includes only endowed NFMC Awards. Check Individual State Federation websites for possible additional awards.

APPLICATION, INFORMATION AND SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Award requirements are available on the NFMC website, nfmc-music.org, or contact the Chair of the specific award.

All NFMC award applications must be submitted online on the NFMC website.

U.S. CITIZENSHIP REQUIREMENT

Applicants for individual awards must be native-born/naturalized U.S. citizens. (Exceptions: Lynn Freeman Olson Composition, Lynn Freeman Olson Piano Pedagogy Award, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award and International Music Camp – at least 50% of IMC award recipients must be U.S. citizens.)

NFMC MEMBERSHIP

Applicants must be NFMC members either by individual, organizational or associate group affiliation before applications are accepted. (Exceptions: Young Artist Awards, Ellis Piano Duo Awards, National Music Week Essay, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award, Centennial Chamber Music Commendation, Summer Music Center Awards, and the three Armed Forces Awards.) Application forms include specific membership information.

Note: In competitions requiring NFMC membership, applicants must hold membership in the division in which the competition is listed (e.g. Junior entrants must be members of the Junior Division; Student entrants of the Student/Collegiate Division, etc.)

FIRST PLACE WINNER LIMITATIONS

- No individual may enter, in the same year, competitions in multiple divisions even if they hold membership in more than one division.
- No first place winner of an individual NFMC award listed in the C&A Chart is eligible to compete again for the same award.
 (Exceptions: NFMC Veterans Awards where entrants may win first place awards multiple times but not consecutively, and the Jr. Composers competition in which first place winners may compete in a different category but not the same category.)
- First place winners of Arts and American Music Division monetary awards may win first place multiple times, but not consecutively. (Exception: National Music Week Essay Contest)
