### 125 Years & Still Making Waves 2023 CONVENTION WRAP-UP

From June 12 through 17, NFMC members met for the 62nd Biennial Convention in Norfolk, Virginia. Originally scheduled to be held in Norfolk in 2021, that convention was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. To welcome our members back to Virginia, the convention committee members, along with NFMC Executive Director Jennifer Griffin and NFMC Executive

Assistant Ashley Mattingly, prepared an exciting and informative week of workshops, concerts, meetings, and fun activities that engaged Federation members who traveled from across the US to attend.

This year the Young Artist competition was again held at the convention hotel, allowing members to attend the semi-final and final rounds around the convention schedule. Thanks to the hard work and ingenuity of Paul King, Vice President of Jordan Kitt's Music, 7 beautiful Yamaha pianos from Maryland, DC, and Virginia were delivered to the Sheraton Norfolk Waterside Hotel on Sunday, June 11, allowing the convention committee members to prepare the meeting spaces with these beautiful instruments. It should be noted that 2023 marked the final year for the Young Artist Competition to take place in person. Starting in 2025, while all rounds of the competition will be conducted virtually, the winners concert will still be presented live at the conventions.

Tuesday, June 13 was a busy day. The Young Artist semi-final rounds were held, allowing Federation members and friends to register, check into their accommodations, and then move between competition rooms to hear the voice, piano, and string candidates. Pre-convention meetings and the first rehearsal of the Festival Chorus were held, followed by a dinner cruise on the Elizabeth River aboard the Spirit of Mt. Vernon. The professionalism and hospitality of the City Experience staff made the cruise enjoyable and allowed friends to relax and visit while taking in the breathtaking sights of Norfolk. After a leisurely stroll back to the hotel, final preparations were made by the committee for the next day, the opening of the Convention.

Wednesday morning began with the Procession and singing of the Processional Hymn, led by Dan Andersen and performed by the US Army Training and Doctrine Command Band (TRADOC) Brass Quintet. We enjoyed a Pre-Opening Concert by the Quintet which included arrangements of El Capitan by Sousa, The Muppet's Show Theme by Henson & Pottle, Friend Like Me by Menken, and ended with Royal

Fireworks Music by Handel. Following the official welcomes, Jeannine Morris was asked to come to the front of the general meeting room and was introduced as the 2023 Lifetime Achievement Award Recipient. Also during the opening general session, Dr. George Keck presented From the Archives: A Quasquicentennial Celebration followed by a Musical Moment performed by NFMC Carolyn Nelson Award winner Duncan Henry (Bassoon). Performing with the convention collaborative pianist, Mrs. Lana Baily, his short concert included repertoire by Bach, Schreck, and American composer and Norfolk resident Dr. Adolphus Hailstork.



Regional luncheons were held at noon and members were "formally" welcomed to Norfolk by Melody Mermaid, King Neptune, and Lyrical Lobster. It's a safe bet that no one there will ever hear "Under the Sea" in quite the same way again!

Following an afternoon of meetings and workshops, the 2023 Young **Artist Competition Winners were** announced and all enjoyed a concert by these extraordinary musicians that evening.

Thursday, the second full day of the convention, was dedicated to recognizing June as Alzheimer's and Brain Heath Awareness Month. The day began with the election of Members-at-large, included the opening of the Exhibit Hall, and featured a Musical Moment by NFMC Blum Flute Award Winner, Danielle Kim. Performing with Mrs. Bailey, Danielle presented repertoire by Maria, Poulenc, and Goubert. We then launched our themed day with a Music Therapy workshop presented by Nicole Harney.

The Rose Fay Thomas luncheon was held Thursday afternoon and was preceded by a short concert by soprano Denise Nicole Battle and pianist Dr. Harlan Zackery. Lisa Sands, Director of Development at Virginia Opera, was guest speaker at the luncheon.

Thursday afternoon continued with more workshops and presentations highlighting the day's theme. Dr. Jerry Teplitz, Mrs. Katie Myers Ziemba, and Ms. Clauda Guber all held sessions that shared their research and work, touching on managing the stress of change, using music therapy to treat PTSD, and exploring songwriting as a creative tool for wellness. We ended Thursday with a phenomenal concert by international jazz

pianist Cyrus Chestnut who thrilled us with standards Yardbird Suite (Charlie Parker) and Bye Ya (Thelonious Monk), arrangements of Lover (Rodgers and Hart), You and the Night and the Music (Schwartz and Dietz) and a soulful performance of Sweet Hour of Prayer (Wm Bradbury). He also shared his original Baroque Impressions (a reimagining of music by J. S Bach) as well as his In a Sentimental Mood (a profound pairing of music by Duke Ellington and Eric Satie's Gymnopedie no. 1). Cyrus spent time during the after-concert reception visiting with guests and sharing his passion for music and teaching.

Friday's general session included a Musical Moment by Sarah Miller, Beyer Young Composers Award Winner, who performed selections by Ives, Scriabin, and her original composition, Alone in Autumn. After meetings and a workshop that introduced us to Opera on Tap, the Festival Chorus performed their concert. With pianist Kristin Ivers, conductor Dan Andersen led the chorus in a beautiful concert that left everyone in awe. As a reminder, each time NFMC hosts a national meeting, a new Festival Chorus is created. All members of Federation who enjoy singing are invited to participate and can register to sing when they register for the national meeting. The chorus receives music, rehearses, and performs only during the few days of the national meeting, creating a new experience each year.

Immediately following the Festival Chorus Concert, the Courtesy Resolutions were presented, and the 2024 Planning Committee invited everyone to lowa next June.

On Friday evening we gathered for the Formal Banquet honoring State Presidents. Matthew Sabatella, founder of Ballad of America, was the featured speaker, and following the installation of officers for 2023 – 2025, we all attended his concert entitled, A Celebration of America's Music From Plymouth Rock to Rock & Roll.

Saturday morning began with the Memorial Breakfast during which we remembered those members who have passed since our last meeting. The New Board met during which NMW Essay Winner from Virginia, Garima Patel, read her winning essay. Also on Saturday, Junior Day was held with Texas composer Jeremiah Evans. A call for scores encouraged

young composers to submit their materials to Jeremiah and all received a condensed course in compositional techniques for writing art songs and piano solos. Everyone had the opportunity to work with Jeremiah and hear their newly composed sketches performed.

The 62nd Convention adjourned at noon on Saturday, June 17. It was a week filled with fellowship, sharing, and joy.

On behalf of the entire Convention Committee, I extend my sincere thanks to all who made the Norfolk Convention a success. We hope you enjoyed the whimsy woven throughout the week (Bingo, Selfie-Walls, and the NFMC Opera on Tap performance Friday night, to name a few), the beautiful flower arrangements that decorated our tables designed by Allissa Bunner, owner of Interstate 8 Floristry, the special keepsakes designed and created by Portsmouth Music Club member Breena Branham, and the treats found in the convention bags. Let these serve not only as reminders of the Norfolk convention, but as an encouragement to join us in Iowa next year.

### NFMC Lifetime Achievement Awardee - 2023 Jeannine Morris

NFMC's Standing Rules state that the "criteria for the biennial NFMC Lifetime Achievement Award shall include outstanding accomplishments on behalf of the National Federation of Music Clubs, dedication to the goals of the Federation and an unselfish lifetime of work for the Federation." No one has fulfilled those criteria better than the 2023 awardee, Jeannine Morris of the Northeastern Region!

She was presented an engraved glass plaque when the announcement was made at the NFMC convention in Norfolk in June, and no one was more proud than those of us from the Northeastern Region! According to the qualifications list she submitted, she has been active in the Federation since she was a Junior Music Club counselor in 1966 and has held every local, state, regional and many national offices since that time!

Some of those positions in her "unselfish lifetime of work for the Federation" have been her Warren Music Club (Ohio) presidency from 2004 to present, the Ohio Federation president 2004-2008, the Northeastern Region VP 2015-2019, a Rose Fay Thomas fellow since 2012, and more chairmanships than can be listed here. She has been a mentor, an encourager, a leader, an example, as well as a friend to a multitude of us in the Federation and we congratulate Jeannine Morris, this worthy recipient of NFMC's 2023 Lifetime Achievement Award.

Ruth Ann did an excellent job praising Jeannine Morris from the Northeast Region point of view. However, I had the chance to eat supper with Karl and Jeannine in Norfolk and herewith present, in the words of the late Paul Harvey, "the rest of the story."

I have known this couple for a number of years, first as Karl served most capably as Editorial Board chairman. What else would one expect from an English teacher of 35 years? Later they helped host the NFMC conference in Dayton by co-chairing the fundraising. Now Karl has chaired the Hazel Morgan/Myrtle Mehan Education Award for the past 10 years.

Jeannine has lived in Warren, Ohio all her life. She and Karl had the same first grade teacher and married in June, 1961 soon after they graduated from Kent State University. They both taught in Warren City Schools in

the early years of their marriage, but only Karl continued after Jeannine began having babies and rearing their three sons. She continued in music throughout, beginning lessons with her mother on piano. The Morrises still have that baby grand piano in their large music room.

Those three sons have produced six granddaughters who are the lights of the Morrises' lives. Chris and Cathy, who live in Powell, Ohio northwest of Columbus, are parents of Elizabeth, 25, and Stephanie, 23, and they live in California. Greg is married to Dan; and they live in Cleveland and Miami Beach. Tim is the youngest and most prolific. He and Michelle have four daughters: McKenzie is 19; twins Megan and Taylor are 12; and Teagan is 10 and in fifth grade. They live in Arizona.

After Karl retired from the classroom in 1996, he designed their new home and included a great room for the Warren Music Club to meet in monthly. It contains two pianos, one a Steinway studio upright and one her mother's baby grand, and an organ. Their home is handicapaccessible in case anyone ever needs it.

Karl is also musical and has sung in the Festival Chorus in the past. He helps with the monthly music club meetings and has held various offices through the years.

One gets the sense in talking to them that they have a true partnership in every way. Jeannine may have the Lifetime Achievement Award, and deservedly so, but Karl has had a major hand in all that she has accomplished, and vice-versa. Congratulations to both!

### Catch the Wave of New Membership

At the NFMC Convention in Norfolk, Virginia, the 125th Year Celebration Committee led a workshop entitled "Catch the Wave of New Members" on Wednesday, June 14, 2023. Attendees participated in lively discussions in roundtable style, brainstorming ideas for increasing membership. In this MCM issue, ideas for attracting new members will be shared from those discussions. In coming issues this year, other ideas resulting from the roundtable discussions will be shared that might help your club or state address ideas for attracting and retaining members. These topics will include programming, the value of the personal touch, and the use of technology.

### Reach out to new contacts

Potential members can be found in a variety of sources. You could ask music stores in your area to post events or share information about your club. You can establish a synergistic relationship with performing arts groups such in your area. For instance, one club worked with a community orchestra to hold master classes with guest artists for music students. They also hosted conducting workshops, giving students the opportunity to conduct a chamber orchestra. The club then promoted orchestra events. The orchestra became an associate group and some of their members became NFMC members, realizing the value of NFMC membership for themselves and their students.

You can approach university faculty and share with them the resources, awards and scholarships the NFMC offers for college students. The NFMC offers a brochure listing these resources. Elementary, middle and high school teachers can also be approached, inviting them to join your club. Show them the benefits of the NFMC programs for themselves and their students. You could then offer to assist them as well, possibly by starting a program to locate used instruments to donate to needy students.

Host programs and events that your club members can invite friends to and ask them directly to invite their friends. Colorful flyers or invitations allow them an opportunity to do that. Posting an event on Facebook then asking your members to "like" and "share" the post on their own social media feeds is a great way to encourage them to invite friends. They can invite choir members from their churches or community. Friends can be invited to help with a specific cause. The NFMC is for music enthusiasts, music lovers, and music supporters, as well as musicians and teachers.

With the NFMC's long history of supporting and encouraging music in our communities, states and nation, we want to continue to "ride the wave" into the future through the growth and continued development of the organization. We can only do that by reaching out and finding new members to join us in fulfilling our goals. As you are planning your upcoming season this year, make a list of potential contacts, and reach out to establish new relationships with individuals and groups in your communities. Let's all work together to share the gift and joy of music!

### **Dr. Eugene Bierbaum**

In 1995 Dr. Barbara Irish, incoming President of NFMC, introduced the Board of Directors to what would become an almost eighteen year relationship with a new Parliamentarian, Dr. Eugene Bierbaum of New York state. Dr. Bierbaum came highly recommended to her, holding a PhD in Communications from the University of Missouri and the title of Professor of Communication Studies Emeritus at the State University of New York. A Professional Registered Parliamentarian (PRP), he is credentialed by the American Institute of Parliamentarians and the National Association of Parliamentarians. Dr. Bierbaum has extensive experience serving non-profits such as the Association of Jr. Leagues International, The New York State Nurses Association, The Military Order of the Purple Heart Service Foundation, and most recently came out of retirement to serve NFMC again. He served as Parliamentarian under five (Dr. Barbara Irish, Dr. Ouida Keck, Lana Bailey, Carolyn Nelson, and Deborah Freeman) of the past eight national presidents. Dr. Bierbaum adopted the motto of so many parliamentarians, "Let all things be done decently and in order".

As NFMC Parliamentarian in 2009 he revised the NFMC Publication "Practical Pointers on Parliamentary Procedure", compiled by former NFMC Parliamentarian Mrs. Arthur Wilkinson., and he wrote "Parliamentary Guide to Meetings" in 1987, revised and reprinted in 1991. This publication served as a guide for NFMC for many years.

Dr. Bierbaum, father of 5, with 14 grandchildren and 12 greatgrand-children, now resides in Florida with his wife Perla. His sense of enthusiasm, humor and love for our organization were exhibited throughout the years in many ways. He once said he enjoyed NFMC because we liked to meet, eat, and hear music! He taught Line Dancing at Chautauqua for twelve years and shared his expertise in this area, along with his deceased wife, Agnes, at several NFMC national meetings. And his workshops on Parliamentary Procedure at these meetings were always well attended. Past National President, Lana Bailey, had the pleasure of working with him in two capacities and stated about their work together, "As a PNP and Bylaws Chair, it has been my special pleasure to confer with Dr. Eugene Bierbaum, our parliamentarian who was always courteous, professional, and knowledgeable as we addressed federation issues on numerous occasions. His calm, dependable demeanor will be missed." Indeed he will be missed by many of us.

In recognition of his outstanding service to NFMC, several members made donations making it possible to present him with NFMC's highest honor, a Rose Fay Thomas Fellowship and a Life Membership in NFMC. Although now he is fully retired as NFMC Parliamentarian, his influence will remain with NFMC and hopefully he will return to enjoy meeting, eating, and hearing music with other NFMC fellow members in an unofficial capacity.





### INTERNATIONAL MUSIC RELATIONS

In 1925 NFMC sponsored a project called International Reciprocity with the purpose of promoting the presentation of American music abroad. At that time European publishers sold very little American music and almost no native American music. This work included exchanges of programs with other countries.

During the presidency of Anne Gannett, World War II made it impossible for NFMC to hold national conventions in 1943 and 1945 and the work of International Reciprocity changed. Mrs. Gannett's war-time efforts to reach thousands through music resulted in the formation of the War Service Committee. Coordinating the efforts of NFMC led her to serve as Chairman of International Music Relations, formed as an outgrowth of these two projects following the completion of her three terms as NFMC President. The purpose of these groups was to see that the music needs of all peoples of the world must be met, not just Americans. Ever since her presidency and even as recently as 1989 during Mary Prudie Brown's presidency, music, instruments and instrument parts were shipped abroad.

There are differing definitions of the term "International Music". One says it is made of all music that exists in the world, another refers to it as a combination of Western music styles with other genres of nonwestern style. Ethnomusicologist, Robert E. Brown defines the term as "global music" which includes folk music, traditional music, or music by indigenous musicians sharing a connection with their place of origin. Over time, the emphasis on world music has seemed to drift toward the programming of ANY non-American composer, not necessarily composers who reflect the culture of their origin. Since the original idea of NFMC was to serve music of other countries while promoting our music to them, perhaps it is time to shift the emphasis back to global music. And in completing reporting forms in this area, one must keep in mind the original intent of this project-to promote International relations using music of all cultures, not just composers born outside the U.S.

The application form for both Jr. and Sr. Clubs is AR 5-1, found in the Arts Division Publication list on the NFMC website. In addition to questions about programs that were presented, the form provides opportunities to document the following:

Education-how this program has influenced American Music; whether authentic costumes or instruments of the country were used in the presentation.

Exchanges- has the club helped send a student to study internationally or helped an international student study in the U. S.; ways in which clubs have encouraged music relations between nations; ways in which clubs have encouraged the study of American music in other cultures/countries.

This year six Sr. Club reports were submitted and no Jr. Club reports were sent. Congratulations and three monetary awards are given for outstanding programming and promotion of international music and relations. This year we are pleased to present the following awards:

1st Place- \$75 award to the Woodbridge Music Club, Woodbridge, VA 2nd Place-\$50 award to the Music Club of Greenville, Greenville, SC 3rd Place-\$25 award to the Tuesday Musical Club of Pittsburgh, PA

NFMC is comprised of many talented and creative people who can plan and execute impressive programs and projects. And if there is ever a time in our world when we need to encourage world peace and cooperation, it is now. If you agree, begin thinking about what your club can do next year to support this project and to gain recognition for your work.



# Competitions & Awards Division SCHOLARSHIPS

What an exciting time! When the NFMC convention ends, the fun begins and the fun for the Competitions & Awards Division is the awarding of over \$750,000 in scholarships and awards at the club, state, regional and national levels. The convention is an exciting time of division and committee meetings and from those come new awards, new award amounts and new procedures. I'm excited to share with you some of those important changes.

#### First priority for all of us should be to DOWNLOAD A COPY OF THE C&A

Chart which will be updated and available on the website by September 1. This chart will provide you with some opening information on membership and award requirements, applications, and winner limitations. Then you will notice that the chart is organized according to membership categories—Senior, Student/ Collegiate and Junior and then by the awarding years—annual or biennial. Also on the chart is the list of Summer Music Centers, the award amounts and camp dates. All of these centers/ camps have an NFMC representative, but many of the award recipients are chosen by the camp personnel observing the guidelines provided by the endowments that fund these awards.

Finally, there are Club awards which can be either senior or junior clubs. This is where you will find the newest awards you will read about below. The finance committee also met, and I will list the new award amounts that were approved and applicable for the 2023-24 award season below.

NEW AWARDS: The Competitions & Awards Board met to approve new awards and procedural changes. Four new ANNUAL awards at \$25.00 each were created for junior clubs for outstanding work in International Music Relations.

NEW AWARD AMOUNTS: The good news is with the success of investments we are able increase awards amounts for nearly all of the Summer Music Centers and many endowed awards as well.

#### **NEW YOUNG ARTISTS AUDITION PROCEDURES**

There is important news to share! The National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist Audition requirements have dramatically changed effective July, 2023.

The 2025 biennial Young Artist Auditions will include two levels: Preliminary and Final Levels.

- 1. Preliminary Level A 60-minute high quality video recording plus a major work or concerto composed for orchestra (vocalists are exempt from the concerto requirement). Preliminary judges will only adjudicate the 60-minute video.
- 2. Finals: Five finalists from the Preliminary level will be chosen and adjudicated. A separate panel of judges will adjudicate the 60-minute video in addition to the concerto.
- 3. Winners: First and second place winners will be chosen from the five finalists in each category.
- 4. **Performance**: The first-place winner in each category will perform at the June 2025 NFMC Biennial Convention, and each winner will receive the first place award of \$20,000 and 2 years of performances.


This new Young Artist procedure requires a video performance which will eliminate travel, lodging, and meal expenses for the applicants and the judges. In addition, judging fees have been raised to ensure that high profile judges can be utilized.

### The application Deadline is February 1st, 2025; Application fee: \$100

By using current technology, it is anticipated that this new procedure will make the process more convenient for applicants to apply for NFMC's most prestigious award. Please share this Young Artist news with your colleagues and potential applicants.

Look for a new Competitions & Awards chart to be available for download from the NFMC website by September 1. This will be your best guide to inform possible applicants of the award requirements and current contact information. And as always check for and use ONLY current forms. We are not using application forms anymore.

# Where Are They Now?

### LEE DOUGHERTY ROSS

### YOUNG ARTIST LEE **DOUGHERTY ROSS** WOMAN'S VOICE **WINNER 1963**

Recently PNP Dr. Ouida Keck and I were national guests attending the Florida Federation of Music Clubs state convention in Sarasota. An artist on one of the evening recitals was former Young Artist Lee Dougherty Ross, Woman's Voice division winner 1963. Lee and her husband now live in Sarasota where they are very active in the musical life of the city. On the evening recital Lee, who holds degrees in voice and piano from the Eastman School of Music, was piano collaborator. A really inspirational part of meeting this former Young Artist was hearing her talk about what the award has meant to her and the many ways in which this award had aided her professional career.

Talent, intelligence, hard work, beauty, charm—all were attributes abundantly clear in the performance and in our meeting with this former Young Artist. A native of Norfolk, Virginia, Lee Dougherty was seven years old when she saw her mother and brother at the piano and knew that she also wanted to play the piano. She immediately started lessons and continued to study until high school graduation. Lee studied both piano and voice at North Texas State College but left before finishing a degree to enroll at the Eastman School of Music where she completed her degree as a voice major.

Lee Dougherty's performance career included a piano debut at the age of 12 with the Norfolk Virginia Symphony Orchestra, a performance of Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2 with the Eastman Rochester Symphony, and an extensive singing career that included performances at Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, the Broadway stage in New York, and Queen Elizabeth Hall in London. A highlight of her two years of bookings as an NFMC Young Artist was a performance at the White House on September 6, 1963, as a guest of President John F. Kennedy and First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy.

In addition to her lifelong career as a performer Lee Dougherty has a second career. For 27 years Lee and her husband, Jerold Ross, have supported the careers of young musicians through an organization called Artists Series Concerts of Sarasota. The Ross's had hosted musical performances in their home in Milwaukee given by their many musical acquaintances. After moving to Sarasota, Florida, they continued these recital programs which have grown in popularity into the Artists Series Concerts with a formal structure, Board of Trustees, patrons, friends, venues throughout the city, and a competition for young musicians complete with scholarships. The concerts feature emerging artists. According to the website, artistseriesconcerts. org, the opening concert for the 28th season in October will be NEXUS Chamber Music founded by Alexander Hersh, 2019 NFMC Young Artist String division winner, invited back following their enormously successful Artists Series Concerts debut in 2022.

Lee Dougherty Ross continues an active concert career, appearing as collaborative artist on Artists Series Concerts and in other venues throughout the area of Sarasota/ Bradenton, Florida. She continues to fulfill the highest ideals envisioned by the creators of the NFMC Young Artist program in 1915, a lifelong devotion to her own professional performances and to promoting the careers of the next generation of young musicians.


Over two dozen people attended the South Central luncheon June 14. There they discussed plans for Federation Days and reported on what the states were doing during the past year.





In Good Hands is a composer/teacher/student project that includes two areas: **Collaboration**: A Cascadia composer writes a piece specifically for a student or ensemble; and Score Call: Cascadia composers submit pieces which have previously been written or are newly composed. These are not written for a specific student. Teachers then pick a piece for their student(s) from the list. This is a unique opportunity for students as they have a chance to work with living composers.

Many Oregon Federation of Music Clubs students participated both in the collaboration and score call division of In Good Hands. Dianne Davies, Pauline Eidemiller, Wilma Hawkins, Irene Huang, Jan Mittelstaedt, Cindy Peterson-Peart, and Nancy Stone are teacher members of OFMC. Most of the performers are students of these teachers.

The concert was a huge success. Some of the collaborations were named "Late for School," "Surprised Squirrel," named by the student, and "Dragons Take Flight." The program included piano solos, a piano duet, a vocalist, and a piece for flute and piano. Composer, Liz Nedela, wrote a piece called "Dance of the Lanna." This Thai Classical Dance for Solo Piano is the portrayal of a festival in the Northern Region of Thailand. This piano rendition uses techniques unique to the style of Thai music, depicting instruments that are foreign to pianists. Another piece by Dr. Lisa Neher, "Oillipheist" was taken from Irish mythology. The Oillipheist is a great sea serpent-like creature which lives in lakes and rivers.

The concert was held on July 15, 2023 at Portland State University's Lincoln Recital Hall. This is an annual event that was started by Cascadia Composers in 2010.

### **WISCONSIN**

### Being part of a community – Your Home Town

Music clubs should not stand alone in their communities. It is crucially important for membership retention and recruitment that your Music Club name is associated with positive activities, programs, concerts and events. In addition, are you reaching out to all age groups? Are you inviting others in your community to join or share in music education, outreach, and program participation?

Outreach is more than leading music programs or sing-a-longs for shut-ins, retirement facilities, VA centers, and children's hospitals. Outreach is also drawing together groups that desire to better their communities with activities that promote the best in us. It is caring for one another, and supporting one another, with the possibility of expanding music involvement and recognition along with increasing membership in our clubs.

Invite other civic groups or non-profits to share in programs and concerts, like the Kiwanis, Rotary, Jaycees, VFW or Elks. When was the last time you invited the Boys and Girls Clubs, Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts, or

the local public library children's or program directors? Draw together diverse civic groups in order to make the most impact in improving the opportunities for young people to learn about music.

Remember to include your area schools in your outreach efforts and include them in your club's annual concerts and programs. Because some schools are cutting music classroom funding, music clubs need to consider how and where music students are able to learn. Is your club helping to bridge the music gap so that students who wish to learn about music may do so? Are you being an advocate in arts funding in your local school? One voice can make a difference, and many voices questioning why funding cuts have been made in the arts can change the course of children's lives in your schools. (See the NFMC Manual page about Arts Advocacy.) I strongly advise you to review what your music classrooms are lacking, help your local music teachers, and ensure that all students can access school music programs. Music club members know – the arts make a difference in lives! Involve your local school music teachers, as well as private music teachers, in your club plans on an annual basis.

Invite others to learn about what you do, how you promote music, how to reach teachers of music in your community, where students can find financial help to attend music camps, and who can help students purchase (or borrow) band and orchestra instruments.

Invite a Music Therapist to inform your club about the importance of music for all ages. June was Alzheimer's and Brain Health Awareness Month. At the NFMC Convention in Norfolk, VA, attendees were reminded of the importance of bringing music to those who are affected by isolation and loneliness. Educate yourselves on making music by helping patients with purchasing songbooks or choral music, guitars, percussion instruments, and electronic pianos. Choral members and directors, consider starting a Dementia Chorus, choirs, bands or orchestras, or whatever direction your imagination takes you after consulting with the administration of a specific facility. Reach out to VA hospitals, shut-ins, retirement communities, children's hospitals, or others in your home town.

Let us all share our musical talents and gifts with others. You will change your life as well as theirs.
