





Introducing Vivace!

NFMC's new online system for Festivals management

Vivace was launched in December 2019. By the time you are reading this, Vivace will be in use. All data from the original system in place since 2014 was migrated over, and users of that system (Legacy) are now actively using Vivace to register students, schedule Festivals, print ratings sheets, and other tasks as needed in Festivals management. Ratings will be entered in the new system when Festivals are completed, and the reports due to state Festival Chairs will be completed with the push of a button.

What is next for active users of the original NFMC Online Festival Management System (Legacy)?

All Festival Chairs were contacted about the dates for conversion and registration dates were adjusted for upcoming Festivals. Orientation webinars were scheduled for November and December, and the practical committee is hosting ongoing help Q&A sessions each month for users. Thank you to all the State Chairs who submitted applications so we had your information as we planned the launch.

What is next for States and Festival Areas that did not use the Legacy system?

By the time you read this, the conversion to Vivace will be complete and all Legacy users will be actively managing Festivals with the new system. If you didn't use the Legacy system, getting your data in has to take place at the right time in your festival cadence. We have an approach

for how you can enter in historic performances, but not "in process" registrations and festival components. Therefore, once your Festivals are completed this year, then States/Areas new to using the NFMC online system will be able to complete their recording of past performances in Vivace and be ready for the next cycle. We are asking for each State or Festival Area to submit a project application, so we have your pertinent information. Many applications have already been submitted and are in line to start the process. We must manage the number of new users that come onboard at any one time so that there is adequate support for the process.

Since we have a variety of "starting points" for various Festival Areas, we will be creating project guides for use in migrating from a manual system or an area- or state-specific system. For areas not using the original system, basically there will be two options:

- **1. Manual Entry:** This will take lots of volunteer hours but will involve very little cost.
- 2. One Time Import: This will also take time to prepare and will involve some cost to the local area as the data is reviewed, approved and imported by the developer.

Project Applications (if not yet submitted)

- 1. Request a project application by emailing festivals@nfmc-music.org.
- **2. Continue to gather the information** that will be needed in the new system if you are not a current user.
 - **a. Teacher information:** full name (first, middle, last) preferred name and birthdate.
 - Student information: full name (first, middle, last), preferred name and birthdate
 - c. Point history data to include the year, Festival, event, class, and rating. It is not necessary to enter the required and choice piece repertoire information for past events.

New Bulletin

Bulletin Advisers started entering their selections for the new Bulletin into the development platform of Vivace. That data was migrated in December as work continued, and will be used to create the Bulletin pages for proofreading by the advisers, and then the final Bulletin for publication.

The Practical Committee is excited that the launch of Vivace is here and we are proud to finally be able to share all of our hard work with the rest of the NFMC Festivals community.

Looking Ahead to 2020



I hope you have remembered to use JR 1-1 to keep "track" of all the things you and your students have done in 2019 and are now doing in 2020; recitals, club meetings, submitting poems, essays, and compositions from your talented students. These are ways to not only encourage our students, but offer opportunities. How exciting for a child to state that through Junior Keynotes their poem, essay, or Junior Music Club "has been recognized nationally." We as teachers have the role of instruction as well as that of encouragement and NFMC assists us and our students through Junior Clubs to be able to display in many areas the skill and joy of music as well as the enthusiasm of recognition, which is encouragement.

Check out what Susan Carlock, teacher/counselor, and students of the Musical Notes Junior Music Club in Ohio have been doing:

Musical Notes Jr. Music Club

Dayton, Ohio

Musical Notes are soaring at the Carlock Music Studio in Dayton, Ohio! We are having a great time practicing, playing and creating together!

Musical Notes Jr. Music Club began in 1986 in Dayton, Ohio. We are active in OFMC Jr. Festival in District III-G at Wright State University. This upcoming year, we will have 16 members with 43 entries in the categories of Piano Solo, Hymn Playing, Piano Concerto and Theory Exam. In 2019, we added nine additional Gold Cups to the present 89 Gold Cup total. Last year we received 30 Superior ratings in the 35 events entered! Spectacular! Eight students received a perfect 100% on their theory exams! Solo students have played in the Festival Honors recital, District Honor recital and State Honor recital at the OFMC convention. I have the honor of being the coordinator of the District Honors recital. Another fun part of our Jr. Club is when adult students and previous students help with the Jr. Festival as room monitors and assistants. Everyone loves Jr. Festival Day!

The Hymn Playing event has helped to prepare students for outside musical opportunities. Learning to read an open "SATB" score in hymnbook form as well as present day "worship music" style enables students to be able to play for church as well as be accompanists for the high school choir, musicals and community theatre!

In April 2020, one student will participate in OFMC's Venetia Hall Piano Concerto Competition in Columbus. We are really looking forward to this exciting competition!

In 2018, we received the Jr. Composers Club Award! In 2018, three students won 1st and 2nd places in their age groups and continued to the Regional Competition. In 2019, one student placed second. Did you know that OFMC Gold Cups are awarded for this event also? This year, five students are working to meet the January 15, 2020 deadline. We have "Composition Day" at the Studio in October. Everyone who is presently writing, brings their laptop and we begin putting the compositions on Noteflight.com. Everyone enjoys encouraging one another and listening to the beginning of one another's composition. Besides the Gold Cup, there are also monetary awards for entries winning first and second place. Show your students the Ohio Composer booklet! They could have their pieces published! The music of tomorrow depends on young musicians composing

topic for the year. Three students in Musical Notes have won 1st place in the state of Ohio. Last year, Sophia Wang won. Sophia wrote about "Music ... the Magic Key." There is a monetary award for the essay. Her essay was published in *Junior Keynotes*.

One thing that is very important in the Studio is preparing a composition for a recital. In the three Studio recitals during the year, courtesy and performing practices are stressed. The February recital is our "American Composer" recital in preparation for upcoming Jr. Festival. This gives everyone a chance to hear one another and encourage them in how much they've improved since last February! Annually in June, we have an Ensemble recital in which everyone plays a "Primo" as well as "Secondo" part to a piano duet. We don't just stop there! We have trios and quartets ... yes, four students cozy up together at one piano - it's very fun! In December for our formal "Holiday" recital, students choose a standard repertoire piece

and also share a "holiday" song.

In our community, Musical Note students visit retirement and assisted living communities to share their music. Last year two students took the time to branch out into these communities to perform, either in sing-alongs or with a school group. During this summer, a student participated in the Stephen Foster Music Camp at Eastern Kentucky University. He had a blast and learned a lot!

This year, music history was a large part of our Studio events. We have been studying "Musicians and their Music" in history, art, architecture, clothing, and daily life of the "period of time" in which the composer lived. Do you know which composers were writing music when George Washington was president of the United States? One student had the opportunity to present her project of "Two Debussy Preludes" for her French Impressionism unit at school.

We at Musical Notes JMC hope that we have inspired you to "keep on keeping on" in your musical activities and Studios and maybe add a few extra events to spice up your musical adventures!

We promise in all our power to make America truly musical!




Guidelines *for* Publication

May is when you might want your club to consider applying for a \$100 award given to clubs that present the best program featuring music written by American Women Composers only. Refer to AM 6-1 for all of the details, but basically this award is designed to afford wider hearing and to stimulate American women composers; to encourage their increased use by solo artists, performing groups and students. All NFMC Senior Active Clubs are eligible to apply. A program is entitled to be entered if it consists entirely of works by American women composers. For details, refer to AM 6-1 and get your entry postmarked by May 15, 2020.

Although there are countless wonderful women composers, this month I have chosen to feature Wendy Stevens. She is a composer, pianist, teacher and clinician. I often have beginning students who cannot read notes yet. I have taught pieces by rote, but prefer this composer who writes using set hand positions and fingerings. Then, the next year we can move to true notation. Wendy's pieces are engaging to my students and very captivating.

This information comes from her bio in the Willis Publisher website. Wendy Stevens received her Bachelor of Music in Piano Pedagogy and her Masters of Music in Theory and Composition from Wichita State University where she graduated summa cum laude. Wendy has been a recipient of the MTNA STAR award (Student Achievement Recognition Award) upon graduation. She has also taught theory at Wichita State University and adjudicates for music events in her area. In addition to her studio teaching, she has served as a church musician playing the piano for more than 20 years.

Wendy is a member of MTNA, KMTA, and her local association WMMTA. She has served as president and in many other positions in WMMTA, and has also served on the board for KMTA. She is a nationally certified teacher of music and is a member of ASCAP, the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers.

2020 STILLMAN KELLEY AWARD FOR ALL INSTRUMENTS; THELMA BYRUM AWARD FOR PIANO

Seeking talented young instrumentalists who will not have reached their 19th birthday by March 1, 2020!

The Stillman Kelley/Thelma Byrum competitions are a great opportunity to earn monetary awards as well as recognition. At the national level, the nine monetary awards have been increased for the 2020 competition! First place = \$1,500. Other awards range from \$250-\$750.

Briefly: students enter first on the state level. The entrant submits a digital recording of the program on his or her selected solo instrument performed entirely from memory. Each state chooses one winner to advance to national judging. The applicant must upload the required material to the NFMC website (www.nfmc-music.org/applicant-fileupload) in time to arrive by February 1.

For a complete set of rules, guidelines for repertoire and application forms, go to the NFMC website www.nfmc-music. org and look under Competitions and Awards/Junior Division or contact the national chair. See forms JR 13-1 and JR 13-2.

The Stillman Kelley competition was established in 1938 for the continued musical education of exceptionally talented junior members of the National Federation of Music Clubs to honor two eminent music educators, composers and leaders who had done so much for music in this country.

The Thelma Byrum Piano Award was added in 1980. It goes to the top scorer in piano unless that is the Stillman Kelley winner. In that case, the Byrum award goes to the next highest scorer in piano. To be considered for the Thelma Byrum piano award, piano applicants should follow the Stillman Kelley rules.

The C&A Chart may be downloaded from www.nfmc-music. org or ordered from NFMC Headquarters, 1646 Smith Valley Rd. Greenwood IN 46142. The Chart includes only endowed NFMC Awards. Check Individual State Federation websites for possible additional awards.

APPLICATION FORMS, INFORMATION AND SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Award requirements and application forms are available on the NFMC website www.nfmc-music.org or contact the Chair of the specific award.

All NFMC award applications must be submitted online by uploading them to the NFMC website.

U.S. CITIZENSHIP REQUIREMENT

Applicants for individual awards must be native-born/naturalized U.S. citizens. (Exception: Lynn Freeman Olson Composition, Lynn Freeman Olson Piano Pedagogy Award, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award and International Music Camp – at least 50% of IMC award recipients must be U.S. citizens.)

NFMC MEMBERSHIP

Applicants must be NFMC members either by individual, organizational or associate group affiliation before applications are accepted. (Exception: Young Artist Awards, Ellis Piano Duo Awards, National Music Week Essay, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award, Centennial Chamber Music Commendation, Summer Music Center Awards, and the three Armed Forces Awards.) Application forms include specific membership information.

Note: In competitions requiring NFMC membership, applicants must hold membership in the division in which the competition is listed (e.g. Junior entrants must be members of the Junior Division; Student entrants of the Student/Collegiate Division, etc.)

FIRST PLACE WINNER LIMITATIONS

- No individual may enter, in the same year, competitions in multiple divisions even if they hold membership in more than one division.
- No first place winner of an individual NFMC award listed in the C&A Chart is eligible to compete again for the same award. (Exception: NFMC Veterans Awards where entrants may win first place awards multiple times but not consecutively, and the Jr. Composers competition in which first place winners may compete in a different category but not the same category.)
- First place winners of Arts and American Music Division monetary awards may win First Place multiple times, but not consecutively. (Exception: National Music Week Essay Contest)
