


# THE GIFTS OF A PIANO ADVENTURE


Finally, NFMC Federation Festival Cups Chair Mary Jane Timmer reports strong participation in the Cup program. Please take a moment to read about the President's and




Grand Cup recipients for 2020.

## **Paper vs. Digital Sheet Music:** Legal Information You Need to Know

In the 2020 Bulletin there are many more pieces that are published in digital editions than ever before. Many composers are moving to only publishing in a digital format, while others use a combination of digital and hard copies, and of course, there are many who only utilize traditional hard copies.

While we all will continue to use and love our paper sheet music and books, the availability of digital music is continuing to grow. And digital music is definitely a godsend during these times of the coronavirus. As many teachers opt for virtual online lessons, digital music became a necessary tool of the trade.

Since a legal digital printout can look like an illegal photocopy, it becomes important to educate everyone (students, parents, teachers, Festival chairs and judges) about the proper verification that needs to accompany the judge's score for Festival.


Copyright compliance involves legally purchasing a copy of the music. With hard copy music, this is easy. Just go and buy the book or sheet music. But with digital music, where the purchase is done online, and the "sheet music" exists as a PDF in the invisible realm of cyberspace, it becomes more difficult to tell at-a-glance if the score has been legally purchased.

Here are some things to keep in mind when providing verification (student, parents, teachers) or when checking the verification (Festival chairs, judges):

• Some digital sheet music comes with a studio license. What this means is that the purchaser (generally the teacher) can print as many copies as they want for the students that they personally teach. (Personally, I love studio licensed music. It means that I always have enough copies.) Look for the license printed on the top or side of the music. Also include purchase information (an email receipt is ideal).

- Much digital sheet music is purchased with an individual license. This means you purchase one copy per student. If you will need two judge's copies, you will need to purchase two digital files.
- · Let's be honest: there's a lot of free music that publishers and composers are giving away. Some of this free music you have to "order" thru their normal purchase procedure, and others it might be just a "click here to download" button. The normal ordering option will most likely generate a purchase receipt just as if you'd shelled out some cold hard cash (well, really, entered your credit card information, but you get my point). But if it's just a "click here" scenario, you might need a screenshot of the "freebie" page or something like that.
- And lastly, iPads are perfectly acceptable to use for viewing the **judge's scores.** Just be sure to include the purchase information (in a printed or virtual version).

Embracing the technology that digital music involves can be intimidating at first. But be brave, and pretty soon you'll be downloading music like a teenager. As always if you have any questions, be sure to reach out to me at bulletineditor@nfmc-music.org. Take care and be safe.

### On boarding into Vivace

"Vivace," our new online system for NFMC Festivals management is now being accessed by Festivals new to the system.

As of November 1st, 35 new areas have begun the work of entering the historical data. So far, the areas new to Vivace this fall have been working swiftly and some have already completed the process of entering historical data. The goal of most of these areas is to be able to use Vivace for registration and reporting in 2021.

The process includes:

- 1. Requesting a project application by emailing: festivals@nfmc-music.org
- 2. Submitting the completed application.
- 3. Receiving the Project Education Guide and carefully studying the process outlined.
- 4. Attending an orientation webinar. (These are held once a month.)
- 5. Selecting the method of entering the historical data.

6. Beginning the process of preparing data for import OR having a National Admin set an appointment with your two Festival Area Admins to grant them access so they can begin the manual entry

### What is the status of our Area's Project Application?

If your Festival Area has already submitted an application, our On Boarding Coordinator, Laurie Marshall, has probably already advised you as to the status of your application.

### What if our Area has not yet submitted a Project **Application?**

If you have not yet submitted an application, it is time! Those submitting application from this point forward should plan to finish entering data after the 2020-2021 Festivals are completed and then be ready for using Vivace for registration and reports in the 2021-2022 Festival year. For everyone's benefit, we will manage the number of new areas who are admitted at any given time so that the support team will be able to provide help in a timely manner.

- 1. Request a project application by emailing festivals@nfmc-music.org.
- 2. Continue to gather the information that will be needed in the new system if you are not a current user.
- a. Teacher information: full name (first, middle, last) preferred name and birthdate.
- b. Student information: full name (first, middle, last), preferred name and birthdate.
- c. Point history data to include the year, festival, event, class, and rating. It is not necessary to enter the required and choice piece repertoire information for past events.

### **Process to prepare data for Vivace**

Since we have a variety of "starting points" for various Festival Areas, we created the Vivace Project Education Guide for Areas that want to start using the system. Basically, there will be two approaches:

1. Manual Entry of history: This will take lots of volunteer hours but will involve very little cost. There will be help materials as well as Regional and National project coaches available to help you through the process.

2. One Time Import of history: This will take time to prepare and will involve some cost to the local area to export and import their history. Those areas choosing this process will be more limited in number, as we must rely on the developer's time to review and approve each import file. 🗷



## 2019-2020 Federation Festivals Cup Report

The 2019-2020 Federation Festival season is one we will not soon forget! The pandemic that hit in the early spring forced many Festival Chairs to become creative quickly! Kudos to those of you who had to think fast in order to comply with regulations and hold a safe Festival!

So, my job of accepting and approving the Grand and President's Cup applications, and gathering all cup information from each state, usually completed by June, continued on into October and I can now give you a more accurate report.

Covid, which forced us into our homes, kept us from gathering with friends and introduced most of us to a new fashion statement, masks, did not keep our young performers from practicing, continuing their lessons or earning Federation Cups! There were 107 Grand Cups awarded to students ranging from 10th grade to Adult and 32 President's Cups awarded to students ranging from 11th grade to adult for a total of 139 advanced cups! Florida and Ohio awarded the most Grand and President's cups. Fantastic job everyone!

Now, on to the state totals. This will really surprise you! The total of ALL size Federation cups awarded in the 2019-2020 Festival season is 15,503! Doesn't that just take your breath away? And we have not received reports from four states, so the total could be even higher. In total cups, Utah led the way with 1,566 and Florida with 1,370. Thanks to all of the State Cup Chairs for getting your information to me as quickly as you possibly could. Let's try for 100% state cup recording for this upcoming season.



# Junior Composers Online Institute

For the first time in Junior Composers Summer Programs history, we have held two composing programs in one year! After great enthusiasm for our first Composers Online Institute (COI) last summer, we planned and executed a second, more intimate COI experience in November 2020. We'll share more on that program later, so stay tuned!

In the meantime, I want to highlight an aspect of COI that has contributed greatly to its success as a new virtual composing experience. When first launching COI and exploring its possibilities, our faculty discussed the need to inform and educate composers who might be interested in a virtual program but may not yet have the technological literacy to fully participate. To address this need, faculty member Eric Radloff used his extensive recording experience as a professional singer/songwriter to create the COI "Song Blog." Before COI began and throughout the virtual program, Eric posted highly educational, approachable blog articles discussing multiple types of DAWs (digital audio workstations), tips for recording and production, general insights

on songwriting, summaries of guest performer virtual salons, and so much more!


Since launching COI, we have received so much positive feedback from the Song Blog and Eric's excellent explanations of recording technology in music. ## Woody Guthrie: The Story of "This Land is Your Land"

### This Land is Your Land

This land is your land, and this land is my land From the California, to the New York Island From the Redwood Forest, to the Gulf Stream waters This land was made for you and me As I went walking that ribbon of highway I saw above me that endless skyway Saw below me the golden valley This land was made for you and me I roamed and rambled, and I've followed my footsteps To the sparkling sands of her diamond deserts All around me a voice was sounding This land was made for you and me When the sun come shining, then I was strolling And the wheat fields waving and the dust clouds rolling A voice was chanting as the fog was lifting This land was made for you and me This land is your land, and this land is my land...

Can you just hear the tune in your mind as you read the words? This is just one of the 1000 songs that Woody Guthrie wrote that is strictly American Folk Music. Did you ever wonder why and how it was written? It was first recorded in 1944 as a reaction to Irving Berlin's "God Bless America". It was originally titled "God Blessed America". Woody wanted to say that America was not equal for everyone. This was a protest song mixed with a patriotic feeling. There were originally two verses, which were fairly political. These verses do not typically find their way to the elementary school music books. \* See the end for the extra verses.

He was a real vagabond travelling all over our country with ordinary

folk. He would often hitchhike (unheard of in today's society!) to Texas from Oklahoma to California. He would write songs about what he saw and whom he met. He tried to describe our country through the hard times of the Depression. He wanted to encourage Americans. He had a lot of energy and talent. He would get up in the morning and write songs on whatever he had around him: newspapers, envelopes and Christmas wrapping paper. He left a lot of them just laying around. It is thought that someone will find one of Woody's songs in a shoebox or an attic! His talent was writing about ordinary things, which many people did not even have a clue existed.

Woody wrote all the time, songs and journals or letters. He has been called a living testament bringing songs to common, everyday workingman's life in America during the Great Depression. Some others who wrote and performed during this time period were Big Crosby (Brother Can you Spare a Dime), Louis Armstrong (I've Got a Right to Sing the Blues), Dick Robertson (If I Ever get a Job Again), Judy Garland, (Life is just a Bowl of Cherries and Somewhere Over the Rainbow) Harry McClintock (In the Big Rock Candy Mountain.) Maybe you would like to hear them on UTube.

There are many more folk singers influenced by Woody. Including Lead Belly, the Carter Family, Will Rogers and Joe Hill. Bob Dylan and Pete Seeger were later artists influenced by Woody.

Woody's daughter, Nora Guthrie wrote in an interview in Tulsa about her father. She was asked about what do you think Woody was seeing when he made his way across the country? ("This Land is Your Land" turning 80: the Story behind the song, by Jimmy Tramel, Tulsa World, Feb. 17, 2020.)

"When you read the lyrics, if you forget Woody Guthrie and the whole myth, the whole hoopla, and if you just look at the lyrics and you just imagine that anybody wrote it, it's basically a description of traveling across the country in a specific time," she said, adding that she has always approached the song as more of a journal than an anthem.

She said her father always wrote, "All you can write is what you see" at the bottom of lyrics. He wrote those at the bottom of "This Land is Your Land."

"So you have to take that as his starting point," she said. "He saw wheat fields waving. He saw diamond deserts. He saw churches that were giving food out to hungry people. He saw signs that said 'no trespassing' or 'private property.' So you have to take it all, based on his M.O., that it is exactly what he saw. And the fact that he wrote it within two weeks of having crossed the country kind of is further evidence that's the way to really look at the song."

The song didn't gain popularity until the 1950s, when it was first published in a songbook used by public school teachers, according to "My Name is New York," Nora's audiobook about Woody's New York experiences.

The song evolved as history evolved. Credit folksinger and activist Pete Seeger for facilitating the evolution. Seeger started singing it during the "blacklisting" era, and he sang all the verses instead of the shortened and tamed-down version of the song.

All the verses? There are more?

The "extra" verses reference no-trespassing signs/private property and hungry people at the "relief office." Maybe you could call them political. Nora used the term "observational."

"Have you ever driven across the country?" she asked. "I used to drive back and forth all the time. At that point, there were so many private property signs you couldn't get to a beach. You couldn't get to a lake because everybody owned property on the lake. This was in the '70s. I remember thinking, gosh, maybe that's what Woody meant in a way. Here is this pretty lake and nobody can swim in it except these 10 families. It just didn't seem quite right ...


"I think that was kind of Woody's observation as he traveled as there were a lot of places you couldn't go. And then there were places you could go. And he was only 27, by the way, when he wrote it. So I think this was kind of brewing in his mind. Why can't I swim in that lake? Why can I walk here, but I can't walk there?"

Regardless, Seeger added "a lot of notoriety and meaning" to the song and additional meaning built up after Bob Dylan hopped aboard, according to Nora. Remember those kids who were introduced to "This Land is Your Land" at school?

"They all knew (the song) and when the rallies started taking place with the anti-Vietnam War stuff, it kind of became the voice of that generation," Nora said. "And Pete Seeger is the one who taught it to them. And that's what I mean when I say it kind of evolved. Woody didn't have much to do with it other than writing the song. And it's kind of funny. A lot of people say, 'How come you leave out certain verses ...?' And I kind of have to laugh. Woody is the one who kind of left it out because he never recorded (the full version). So that's kind of curious, right?" ...

### **COMPETITION AND AWARDS (C&A) CHART**

The C&A Chart may be downloaded from nfmc-music.org or ordered from NFMC Headquarters, 1646 Smith Valley Rd. Greenwood IN 46142. The Chart includes only endowed NFMC Awards. Check Individual State Federation websites for possible additional awards.

## APPLICATION FORMS, INFORMATION AND SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Award requirements and application forms are available on the NFMC website, nfmc-music.org, or contact the Chair of the specific award.

All NFMC award applications must be submitted online by uploading them to the NFMC website.

### **U.S. CITIZENSHIP REQUIREMENT**

Applicants for individual awards must be native-born/naturalized U.S. citizens. (Exceptions: Lynn Freeman Olson Composition, Lynn Freeman Olson Piano Pedagogy Award, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award and International Music Camp – at least 50% of IMC award recipients must be U.S. citizens.)

### NFMC MEMBERSHIP

Applicants must be NFMC members either by individual, organizational or associate group affiliation before applications are accepted. (Exceptions: Young Artist Awards, Ellis Piano Duo Awards, National Music Week Essay, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award, Centennial Chamber Music Commendation, Summer Music Center Awards, and the three Armed Forces Awards.) Application forms include specific membership information.

Note: In competitions requiring NFMC membership, applicants must hold membership in the division in which the competition is listed (e.g. Junior entrants must be members of the Junior Division; Student entrants of the Student/Collegiate Division, etc.)

### FIRST PLACE WINNER LIMITATIONS

- No individual may enter, in the same year, competitions in multiple divisions even if they hold membership in more than one division.
- No first place winner of an individual NFMC award listed in the C&A Chart is eligible to compete again for the same award. (Exceptions: NFMC Veterans Awards where entrants may win first place awards multiple times but not consecutively, and the Jr. Composers competition in which first place winners may compete in a different category but not the same category.)
- First place winners of Arts and American Music Division monetary awards may win first place multiple times, but not consecutively. (Exception: National Music Week Essay Contest)

### **THE NFMC**


