


Greetings NFMC teachers, students, and friends!

Federation Festivals

This article should find you in the midst of winter, and I trust it finds you well. After the rush of the holiday season, the early months of the year can be a time for setting new goals, stopping to reflect upon the past year, and perhaps just to take a breather—that's what snow days are for! ⁽⁽⁾

The long winter months can be difficult for many people. This is a time when the gift of music should be shared liberally with our communities. Consider planning programs to have your students perform their Festival pieces with those who are unable to get out to go to concerts or recitals. They will be a most appreciative audience and your students will learn valuable lessons about how gratifying it is to share their music.

While winter can seem to stretch on forever, before we know it, Festivals will all be completed and in the books for another year. Here are just a few reminders for everyone.

Teachers: After Festival, be sure to make copies of your students' rating sheets (physical or digital) for your records. If there is ever a discrepancy about a rating, you will need the rating sheet to verify the rating received before any changes can be made in Vivace.

Area Admins/Chairs: Check due dates for reports. Send the applications for 12+ Consecutive Superiors to State Chairs with the necessary documentation.

State Admins/Chairs: Check due dates for reports. Sign and send on consecutive Superior applications.

As always, the NFMC Festivals team is here to help. Reach out at any time for assistance; we're here to help. Have a wonderful Festival season!

FUND FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF MUSICAL ARTS

(FAMA) grants are designed to support a specific music education/outreach project. They are non-renewable and are not intended to support ongoing projects. New grant applicants will receive priority over previous grant recipients, and preference will be given to community projects that strengthen music education/music appreciation in the United States. All decisions of the committee are final.

Vivace Updates

We have been encouraged by the growing expertise of teachers and Festival administrators when using Vivace. Teachers and admins are now understanding the deeper workings of the system and becoming much more comfortable using Vivace.

There are several situations that are still unclear to some. Here are further explanations.

CHANGING A RECORD IN VIVACE

Vivace has many safeguards to ensure that any possible errors are caught prior to recording the event in Vivace. The final step is for the Festival admin to click the "certify ratings" button to record the Festival in Vivace. In the rare event that an error is discovered after the Festival is certified, a scan of the rating sheet must accompany the explanation of the correction needed. Corrections to a certified Festival are completed by a National admin.

FOR BEST RESULTS, USE A DESKTOP OR LAPTOP AND GOOGLE CHROME

Although phones and iPads are becoming much more powerful, best results will always be achieved when using your desktop or laptop AND Google Chrome as your browser. Sometimes the fields are not displayed completely (checkboxes, etc.) or the searches are not as efficient. This can even occur on a desktop when NOT using Google Chrome as the browser.

Make sure your screen display is set at 100% and no more as this can also affect displays. Enlarging the screen display above 100% can make the checkboxes or radio buttons unresponsive.

DECLARED SOLO CLASS

Most concerto and ensemble registrations are possible without declaring a solo class because the student(s) already has a solo history record in Vivace. When the solo history exists, the required correlation between solo and concerto or ensemble classes can be verified. When doing a Concerto or Ensemble registration, first attempt the registration without declaring a Solo Class. Vivace will notify you if there is a need to declare a Solo Class to complete the registration. If you receive that message, contact your Area Admin to assist you.

STUDENT PERFORMANCES IN AN AREA OTHER THAN THE TEACHER'S HOME FESTIVAL AREA

Registering a Student Performing in Another Festival Area to accommodate scheduling conflicts.

Sometimes, a student will have a conflict with the Festival dates offered in the home Festival area.

An ACT or SAT test, family wedding, or state championship competition would be examples of conflicts that most areas accommodate.

When this happens, follow this procedure.

NFMC President 1999-2003

- 1. The teacher should register the student in the "home" Festival Area.
- 2. Fees should be paid to the "home" Area, and certificates and Federation Cups should be awarded from the "home" Festival area.
- 3. The teacher should make arrangements for the scheduling accommodation in the "host" Festival area, and pay any additional fees necessary to the "host" Festival Area.
- 4. When the performance is completed, the "host" Area Admin will contact the "home" Area Admin of the teacher, verify the performance was completed and the rating received. The "host" Festival admin then sends a scan of the rating sheet(s) to the "home" Festival admin as verification. The "home" Festival admin will make sure the rating sheet(s) is distributed to the teacher, and then the student.

Vivace Updates continued...

Registering a Student Who is Taking Lessons online and would like to do a live performance.

Bulletin rules state that Entrants will have an evaluation using the same online media as is used for instruction. The adjudication will be scheduled with the approval of the Area Festival Chair/Admin and judged with the same criteria as a live performance. (Bulletin page xvi)

Some Festival areas have been willing to allow a yearly live performance of the online Student in the location of the student's residence. (Areas are not required to accommodate live performances in these situations, but many have been willing to do so.)

In this more permanent situation, follow this procedure.

- 1. The teacher will need to contact the "host" Festival Area Admin and make sure the area is willing to accommodate a live performance.
- 2. The teacher will need to comply with the request of the "host" Area Admin concerning assistance during the Festival.
- 3. If the "host" area is willing, the teacher will need to pay senior member dues to the "host" area and to the state of the "host" area (if in a different state). This is in addition to their national/state and local area dues paid to the "home" Festival area. Then, the teacher will be added as a teacher in the "host" area in Vivace and will register the student in the "host" area, paying Festival fees to the "host" area.

4. Federation Cups and participation certificates will be distributed by the "host" area since the location is closer to the student's residence.

COMING IN 2025 - NEW FEATURES UNDER THE TEACHER TAB



As part of the Instrumental Music - Piano Performance art form, she took the opportunity to fully immerse herself in chamber music, collaborating with other accomplished high school musicians from across the state. In larger ensembles, Christina has served as the pianist for the Central Kentucky Youth Orchestra for two years in high school. Over the years, she also participated in the ABRSM piano exams and received a Distinction rating for her Grade 8 exam.

Besides piano, Christina enjoys participating in various extracurricular activities including the debate club, student council, and swim team. She will be attending Columbia University in the fall.

Wendell Irish Viola Award

IT'S FALL! Time for Pumpkin Spice Latte and contacting your favorite Junior viola students to remind them to prepare for the Wendell Irish Viola Award competition. The deadline to enter is March 1, 2025. The application requires submission of two pieces in contrasting musical styles and membership in NFMC. Go to nfmc-music.org to apply online. First place award is \$2,000 and second place is \$1,000 with one \$500 award in each of the five regions of NFMC. But you can't win if you don't enter. So prepare your two pieces and enter.





NFMC's Junior Composers Contest is a fantastic way to encourage all of your students to compose original music. If you have never entered your students before, this is the year to get started! The NFMC Junior Composers contest is open to juniors who are American citizens. Students write original compositions, notate them themselves, and submit a pdf of the score and an mp3 recording via the NFMC website by February 1st of each year.

Students are divided into four age classes: Class 1 - Age 9 and under, Class 2 – Ages 10-12, Class 3 – Ages 13-15, and Class 4 – Ages 16-18. Compositions are judged by highly qualified judges at the state level who provide constructive and encouraging comments to each entrant. Up to two winners in each class from each state advance to the regional level of judging. Some states provide cash awards to winners, and some provide scholarships to composition camps. The regional judges select the top two students in classes 1 and 2, and the top three students in classes 3 and 4 to advance to the national level. All regional winners receive \$100.

At the national level, judges select a first and second place winner, and award eleven incentive awards, each of which carry cash awards.

Students also earn points toward Festival Cups. A superior rating on a composition for a single instrument is worth 7 points. A superior rating on a composition for two or more instruments is worth 8 points. An Excellent rating is worth 6 points, and Satisfactory is worth 5 points.

We have also assembled a wealth of videos which explain the NFMC Junior Composers Contest, help you get started with composing, and some celebrity composer interviews with composers like Wynn-Anne Rossi and Tom Gerou talking about how they approach teaching composition. 




Junior Club Achievement

He has taken Masterclasses with J.Y. Song (of The Juilliard School & Mannes School of Music) and Vincent Ip (soloist with MSFO & School of Dance) at Chautauqua Institute NY, and George Li (soloist with Russian National Orchestra) at the Peace Center, Greenville SC.

Outside the studio, Wills is a straight A student, member of Eta Omicron Honor Society, and has earned 59 Dual Enrollment credits so far. 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The Music Club of Greenville GREENVILLE, SOUTH CAROLINA

Since 2006, The Music Club of Greenville of Greenville, South Carolina has sponsored a program begun by members Jane Bauer and Connie Lacquement. Jane, a flutist and Connie, a clarinetist had met thru the music club and both saw the need for instruments in the public schools, especially in an innercity middle school. Jane had taught in the Greenville County School District for 30 years and knew exactly the needs of her students and those in the school system. Connie was a volunteer who recognized the untapped field of students with keen intellectual ability, limited resources, and eager to play in the band. Connie orchestrated over 1400 hours of volunteer time for the Hughes Academy Band.

Jane had a mentor while in high school in Lenoir, NC who had purchased instruments for his students and this wonderful gesture was passed on to Jane. Connie suggested that they initiate a search for used band instruments through *The Music Club of Greenville* to provide repair monies. Brad Wingate, the Director of Fine Arts of Greenville County Schools, gave enthusiastic support. Within two years, requested funds from Greenville County Schools for repairs to supplement the Club's support were secured. Instruments were procured by placing requests for used instruments in church bulletins, networking with local music stores, advertising in the Greenville Symphony programs, advertising at county band clinics or school concerts, garnering support with local radio stations and newspapers. Connie built a network of supporters in the organizations in which she played clarinet - local pawn shops, repairmen, friends and relatives. She was tireless in promoting the project and in building relationships with the local community with her warm personality and persistence. Connie contributed much of her own funds to the project and hundreds of volunteer hours. Also, a web page was developed to advertise the project and to allow a vehicle where donors of instruments could easily access the web page to offer instruments or funds.

Pecknel Music Company in Greenville became a major sponsor of **PITCH** (Providing Instruments to Children). They agreed to be a drop-off point for used instruments and at one point granted a sizable group of instruments to the project as a gift. Chuck Shell, an expert repairman at Pecknel, kept an eye out for rental instruments when returned and would agree on an acceptable price. He helped sell professional model donations, which when purchased, could bring in enough funds to purchase several student line instruments instead. Pecknel, Mr. Shell, and his repair team deserve much credit for excellent repair and delivering the instruments to the designated schools or to the district holding place.

Jane developed the **PITCH** logo, fliers and a brochure. Thank you notes were written to donors and a tax letter for the receipt of the instrument. *The Music Club of Greenville* provided monies for repairs, donated funds and instruments and advertised the PITCH program. Over 2000 instruments have been placed in the public schools (mostly middle schools) of the upstate of South Carolina counties where our club members live. Those instruments are now part of the school inventory, hopefully providing equal opportunity for all students.

What began as a project by a band director in Lenoir, NC – Captain James Cunningham Harper – inspired Jane Bauer to play the flute, to become a band director and to secure instruments for deserving students. Captain Harper set the example by buying instruments himself and teaching talented students to enjoy playing instruments. Now the successful **PITCH** program sponsored by *The Music Club of Greenville* is supporting the music students who aspire to play and enjoy an instrument.

Where Are They Now? GROWING UP IN THE NFMC

I am one of the lucky ones! I grew up surrounded by piano music every day, with a highly respected piano teacher as a mother, Mary Siciliano. Though she never personally taught me, she did make sure I had access to all the incredible opportunities Southeast Michigan had to provide, and "Federation" was an annual event on my musical calendar. Due to MFMC requirements to perform the music of an American composer, and my participation in the Concerto category, these events helped expand my repertoire in a healthy, varied, and important way, paving the path for my future as a conservatory-bound student and eventually concert pianist.

As a concert pianist, private studio teacher, and music administrator living in Chicago, Illinois, I am now fully aware of the necessity for students to be learning American repertoire. Though we are fortunate as classical pianists to be part of a cultural heritage that includes the great genius of Bach and Beethoven, it can be easy to fall into the trap of only learning European music, and then we miss out on the incredible wealth of great composers and musical innovations that hail from the USA. Not only does this limit our knowledge of classical music, but it also limits our reach and flexibility as concert artists. What better way to connect with others in our community than to present the traditions that hailed from our shared homeland! On a personal note, I remember one of the pieces I learned for "Federation" was Scott Joplin's <u>Maple Leaf Rag</u>. Once I learned the notes, I played it everywhere I could, because it was a familiar tune, and really just so much fun to perform! But the most memorable was when I had a chance to perform it at my high school's "Black History Month" assembly. I think it was extra meaningful for my classmates to see me, a white student, embracing Black culture so wholeheartedly, as well as an excellent reminder for me that white Europeans are not the only musicians worth celebrating.

Having a goal to perform a concerto for an adjudicator every year was also important for my musical development. I learned so many concerti through my childhood that I'm certain this is the reason I won concerto competitions and was able to perform with orchestras as a high schooler. I also know this prepared me for an incredible feat: winning the concerto competition at the Eastman School of Music as a freshman!

The last thing I'd like to share is the impact on preparing for and winning awards such as the Stillman-Kelley and Claire Ulrich Whitehurst Awards. I remember the grueling process of having to record my first CD to enter these NFMC competitions. The level of polish required, detail needed, and patience in the recording itself helped set me up for major international audition tapes (I was later accepted into the prestigious Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels, Belgium and the Beethoven Competition in Bonn, Germany). They ultimately prepared me for my first commercial album "Dream Catchers" which earned critical acclaim. I am extremely grateful for the musical growth I developed through Federation events, and cannot recommend them enough to all budding young artists!

North Carolina Royalty Court of Music

In addition to a large State Finals Awards Competition, NCFMC sponsors the NCFMC Royalty Court of Music. The Royalty Court Competition was begun many years ago by then State President, Hinda Honigman, and has been a part of our State Scholarship Finals for decades now. There are four entry categories and students must play only one selection with a time limit. Preliminary auditions are held at Festival time in the three geographical areas of North Carolina and the district winners then compete at the state level in the finals. The four categories are:

Page Boy and Page Girl, Primary III - Elementary III or higher; Awards = \$150 + Loving Cup.

Lord and Lady, Elementary IV - MD III or higher; Awards = \$200 + Loving Cup.

Prince and Princess, Difficult I - Very Difficult I or higher; Awards= \$\$250 + Loving Cup.

King and Queen of Music, Very Difficult II - Musically Advanced II or higher; Awards = \$300 + Loving Cup.

There are also 2nd place awards in all the categories.

COMPETITION AND AWARDS (C&A) CHART

The C&A Chart may be downloaded from nfmc-music.org or ordered from NFMC Headquarters, info@nfmc-music.org. The Chart includes only endowed NFMC Awards. Check Individual State Federation websites for possible additional awards.

APPLICATION, INFORMATION AND SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Award requirements are available on the NFMC website, nfmc-music.org, or contact the Chair of the specific award. All NFMC award applications must be submitted online on the NFMC website.

U.S. CITIZENSHIP REQUIREMENT

Applicants for individual awards must be native-born/naturalized U.S. citizens. (Exceptions: Lynn Freeman Olson Composition, Lynn Freeman Olson Piano Pedagogy Award, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award and International Music Camp – at least 50% of IMC award recipients must be U.S. citizens.)

NFMC MEMBERSHIP

Applicants must be NFMC members either by individual, organizational or associate group affiliation before applications are accepted. (Exceptions: Young Artist Awards, Ellis Piano Duo Awards, National Music Week Essay, Ruth Morse Wilson Handbell Award, Centennial Chamber Music Commendation, Summer Music Center Awards, and the three Armed Forces Awards.) Application forms include specific membership information.

Note: In competitions requiring NFMC membership, applicants must hold membership in the division in which the competition is listed (e.g. Junior entrants must be members of the Junior Division; Student entrants of the Student/Collegiate Division, etc.

FIRST PLACE WINNER LIMITATIONS

• No individual may enter, in the same year, competitions in multiple divisions even if they hold membership in more than one division.

• No first place winner of an individual NFMC award listed in the C&A Chart is eligible to compete again for the same award. (Exceptions: NFMC Veterans Awards where entrants may win first place awards multiple times but not consecutively, and the Jr. Composers competition in which first place winners may compete in a different category but not the same category.)

• First place winners of Arts and American Music Division monetary awards may win first place multiple times, but not consecutively. (Exception: National Music Week Essay Contest)
