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



#### FIRST PRIZE STAFF SERGEANT JORDAN ROBERTS

#### *"Lake Michigan Scenes" for Symphonic Band*

Born and raised in Southwestern Michigan, Staff Sergeant Jordan Roberts has been playing brass instruments since childhood. Before graduating high school, he performed regularly with professional ensembles, including the Battle Creek Symphony Orchestra on tuba. In his senior year, he was accepted into the United States Army Band program as a tubist.

During his Army service, Roberts served as staff arranger and music librarian for various bands. He also attended the University of Alabama in Huntsville, majoring in Music Performance. He has performed with the Grammy<sup>®</sup> Awardwinning Rebirth Brass Band, the Huntsville Symphony Orchestra, the Seoul Philharmonic, Twickenham Winds, and other professional groups.

Roberts' compositions have premiered with the Latvian National Guard Orchestra and several military ensembles, with many of his arrangements becoming staples of Army band repertoire.

Currently, he serves with the 126th Army Band (Michigan National Guard), playing tuba in the concert and marching bands, and trumpet, trombone, and vocals in the Jazz Combo. He is finishing a Music Education degree at Grand Valley State University, where he is involved in the tuba and composition studios and writes drill and arrangements for the Laker Marching Band. In his spare time, he enjoys arranging, composing, and playing goalie in a local men's ice hockey league.



#### SECOND PRIZE STAFF SERGEANT ANDREW KOSINSKI

#### Brass Quintet No. 2

Staff Sergeant Andrew Kosinski is a composer, arranger, and conductor from the Jersey Shore. Praised for his "virtuosic, turbid musical language" and "efficient and effective use of time," his compositions have

been commissioned, performed, and recorded across Europe, Asia, and the United States by artists such as the Monmouth Symphony Orchestra, Peabody Concert Orchestra, Voices of Change, Patagonia Winds, Quinception, violin soloist Tim Fain, and Philadelphia Orchestra piccoloist Erica Peel to name a few.

Kosinski's music has been broadcast on 103.3 WPRB Princeton "Classical Discoveries," and has earned him multiple awards including winner of the Voices of Change Composition Competition, finalist for the ASCAP Morton Gould Young Composer Award, and Best Music Composer in the Tokyo Film Awards. As an active-duty staff sergeant, Kosinski serves as staff arranger for The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own" based in Arlington, Virginia. In this capacity he composes and arranges music for occasions ranging from public concerts to presidential inaugurations. Kosinski also serves as the conducting fellow of the Montgomery Philharmonic for the 2023-2025 seasons.

Sergeant Kosinski earned his degrees in composition at the Peabody Conservatory and Rutgers University where his mentors included Kevin Puts, Amanda Harberg, Scott Ordway, and Robert Aldridge.  $\checkmark$

I open this article on two talented Award winners with my former chair of the Division and other very senior benefactors who make such creativity possible. When I began this work several years ago the Chair of the Division was Ouida Keck. Now my "boss" in the Division is Lucinda Lear. But a year ago at the NFMC in Norfolk, George Keck presented a fine slide presentation of research he had done on the early Founders of Federation. I told him he should make a book of the work. One of the key women in his talk was Mrs Frank Seiberling of Akron, Ohio at her restored Tudor Mansion Stan Hywet Hall. As a high school student I went many times to this building, which is now a museum. Similarly, our work with musical creativity has been substantially sponsored by Emil and Ruth Beyer, who were active with the Federation in Southern Ohio. I never had the opportunity to meet the

Ohio. I never had the opportunity to meet the Beyers, but their funds this year are going to support some very interesting work by two gifted composers. Money and creativity. The proper rules that the Division has set do not allow me to name the judges that we use, but I am

permitted to quote their ideas to the composers themselves. And by extension I can talk about the creative energy in the work itself. These ideas plus the support of the individuals I mention above stir the motivation that keeps me and my judges working at these administrative tasks. I think the end results are very rich and promising.

Here are one of my judges comments: "very effective idiomatic writing for both voice and piano; highly skilled setting of the text in terms of appropriate accents and other elements relating to the sound of the words; excellent notation; very effective musical structure." Flannery is a poet, performer and composer.... As a pianist, they have performed as a soloist with the Southwest Iowa Symphony Orchestra and Augustana Symphony Orchestra. They have appeared on Iowa Public Television performing in the Terrace Hill Piano Competition in 2019."

**Chamber** Music

Our Winner this year in the category of ensemble or Chamber Music is **Nate Krebs**. He won 2nd Place in this category in 2022. His piece that wins this year is titled "Room" Here is a judge comment: "very successful overall musical structure; idiomatic, well written for the individual instruments; very effective composition; many pieces that use techniques such as these don't really work. 

# Youse Adult Composers Award

Debra S. Hughes was the recipient of the Glad Robinson Youse Adult Composers Award in 2023. This biennial Senior award is given in odd numbered years. She entered an original vocal art song based on a poem by Georgia Douglas Johnson, who was born in Atlanta, Georgia and an important figure of the Harlem Renaissance. Hughes, of Georgia Federation, chose to use syncopation and 7th/9th chords in the song's accompaniment, because these rhythmic and harmonic elements were prevalent during Johnson's life. The lyrics in contrast are sung as a smooth, single line to emphasize its message.

"Your World" - G.D. Johnson

"Your world is as big as you make it. I know, for I used to abide In the narrowest nest in a corner, My wings pressing close to my side.

But I sighted the distant horizon Where the skyline encircled the sea And I throbbed with a burning desire To travel this immensity.

I battered the cordons around me And cradled my wings on the breeze, Then soared to the uttermost reaches With rapture, with power, with ease!"

Those wishing to enter this contest as a NFMC member must have never published any compositions before. Hughes was inspired by the poem's message when she found it researching for Music in Poetry samples. She currently is the Southeastern Region Chair for Music in Poetry, NFMC's Chair for Angie Greer Music in Poetry and Editor of the Music in Poetry and Song Book. Hughes has enjoyed writing various programs for church, public school and private school programs in which she had been involved through the years but currently maintains a private music studio. She is very grateful and excited that she came in first place and thanks NFMC for the encouragement and honor to receive this award.  $\checkmark$






















### Insignia

Western: California (50%) Idaho (89%)



# *Including United Nations Agenda* 2030 In Your Plans for the Year

What do you think of when you hear the words, "think globally, act locally?" For over 50 years this powerful phrase has been used to energize individuals to make changes within their communities that have a positive ripple effect on the larger world. As musicians and teachers, we do this daily as we mentor the current and next generation of artists, encouraging them to use their talents to improve the lives of those around them. Every recital, religious service, outreach program, and celebration that we've performed or created has uplifted, informed, and comforted others.

What does this have to do with UN Agenda 2030?

Some of you may not be aware that our Federation has been involved with the United Nations since 1949.

#### BACKGROUND

In 1946 the United Nations General Assembly established the Department of Public Information (DPI) to promote global awareness and understanding of the work of the UN. The DPI's mission was dedicated to communicating the ideals and work of the United Nations to the world, to interacting and partnering with diverse audiences, and to building support for peace, development, and human rights for all.

In 1949, three years after the creation of the Department of Public Information, the National Federation of Music Clubs was accredited and recognized as a Non-Governmental Organization within the UN DPI, one of the first music organizations so recognized. For seven decades the Department of Public Information fulfilled its mission and was an integral part of world-wide changes supporting the pursuit of equality, peace, and prosperity for all. In 2019, DPI was renamed the Department of Global Communications. With it came a new directive, that the department was now committed to the success of **Agenda 2030** and the **17 Sustainable Development Goals**.

#### WHAT IS AGENDA 2030 AND WHAT ARE THE 17 SDGS?

UN Agenda 2030 is a plan of action for our world, a roadmap for ending poverty, protecting the planet, and tackling inequalities. The 17 SDGs, the cornerstone of the Agenda, offer the most practical and effective pathway to tackle the causes of violent conflict, human rights abuses, climate change, and environmental degradation, and aim to ensure that no one will be left behind. The SDGs reflect an understanding that sustainable development everywhere must integrate economic growth, social well-being, and environmental protection.

# HOW CAN YOU CONNECT WITH THE UNITED NATIONS AND UN AGENDA 2030?

As your representative to the UN Department of Global Communications, one of my responsibilities is to share with the NFMC members the work of the United Nations. If you visit the NFMC website, you can access the page, **NFMC And The United Nations**. https://www. nfmc-music.org/about-us/nfmc-and-the-united-nations/ Information about UN Agenda 2030, the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, and links to UN web TV (https://webtv.un.org/en) are all located on that page; links to previous MCM articles are located there as well.

In addition to sharing information with NFMC members, as an NGO affiliated with the UN DGC, I share information with other members of civil society about the work of the Federation. This is accomplished in a number of ways, including my attending and participating in UN meetings and conferences, and my involvement with the UN Decade on Healthy Ageing. My focus on improving the quality of life for older persons stems directly from my experiences with NFMC, and has led to a number of conference presentations as well as the submission and acceptance of a field report that has been published as part of the UN Decade of Healthy Ageing progress report. 


#### **BRIEF BIO:**

### RALPH EVANS 1961 YOUNG ARTIST WINNER

**Ralph Evans**, violinist, prizewinner in the 1982 International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow, concertized as soloist throughout Europe and North America before succeeding Leonard Sorkin as first violinist of the Fine Arts Quartet. Evans, who has toured worldwide with the Quartet for over 40 years, has recorded more than 100 works released on over 50 different albums. 
Evans, a multi-award-winning cum laude graduate of Yale University and Fulbright Scholar in London, studied with Szymon Goldberg and Nathan Milstein in Europe, and subsequently won the top prize in a number of major American competitions, among them, the Concert Artists Guild Competition in New York. Films of his prize winning performances of the Tchaikovsky Concerto and Bartok Concerto No. 2 in the International Tchaikovsky Competition are viewable on YouTube.

Evans has also received international recognition for his work as a composer. His award winning composition "Nocturne" has been performed on American Public Television and his String Quartet No. 1, released on the Naxos label, has been warmly greeted in the press ("rich and inventive" -Toronto Star; "whimsical and clever, engaging and amusing" - All Music

Guide; "vigorous and tuneful" -Montreal Gazette; "seductive, modern sonorities" - France Ouest; "a small masterpiece" - Gli Amici della Musica).

Evans is Professor of Violin and Chamber Music at the New School University's Mannes College of Music in New York. He was the 1961 Young Artist winner in Strings for NFMC.  $\checkmark$





### Dushore Music Club Enjoys "The Mystery of the Naked Violin"

Violins, varnishes, history, mystery, and the universal language and power of music were the topics that the Dushore Music Club was treated to at their monthly meeting held at the Sullivan County Library on Tuesday evening, May 21, 2024.

M. J. (Mary Jane) McCluskey, author of several children's books, came to Sullivan County to speak to the Dushore Music Club about her soon to be published book, *The Mystery of the Naked Violin*. The title refers to the fact that the violin, a real violin, has had its varnish removed and no one knows why, or indeed, anything specific about the violin. Her previous books were: *Grace Comes at Christmas* in 2018, *Grace, Peace, and Noelle* in 2019, *Captain Dargo: Born to Serve* in 2020, and *Love, Hope, and a Pink Bucket: The Handsome Henry Story* in 2022.

The mysterious violin came into the possession of concert pianist, harpsichordist, choir director, music teacher, and York College professor Gretchen Dekker. It was she who proposed to MJ that the story of the violin, with its mysterious history and the potential of it being a very old and valuable instrument - or "one of little value," would make a good children's story. Gretchen came across the instrument following the death of Dr. Charles West Wilson of Chestnut Hill Estate, a historic property in Red Lion, PA. Dr Wilson was the owner of 13 harpsichords and other historic instruments. It was he who invited Gretchen, and her students, to come to his estate to make music on the very old harpsichords. Gretchen and her students played for him many times, including shortly before he died.

MJ's book relates the story of Charlie and Alexandria, who find 4 old violin cases in a locked closet, much as Gretchen found them in the closet at Dr. West's home. The hope is that the story could provide interest in and perhaps raise funds for musical training for more students. Mrs. Dekker was the inspiration behind York's Miller Make Music Festivals in January and June celebrations of International Make Music Day. She is a passionate promoter and advocate of music and music education in the York area.

Ms. Dekker, with the mysterious violin, accompanied MJ to the library event to provide background about violins and in particular about the discovery of this special violin. Grace Zelewicz, a student at Sullivan County High School and a student violinist, accompanied the presentation with a special performance of Beethoven's *Ode to Joy*. Grace's fans in the audience included her mother Jen, brother Lucas, and friends David and Lida Lentz, both student musicians themselves.

Music Club members were privileged to speak with both Gretchen, MJ, and Grace about the book, the violin, and Gretchen's plans for planting a music academy in the heart of York. She currently has the YC Prep at the college, and she's hoping to marry that to SHINE, the foundation for underserved students, and have a "branch office" in downtown York.

MJ read the beginning of the story to Sullivan County's 5th graders in February of 2023 and they shared some creative ideas for the ending of the story. The book has ties to World War II in France and the Netherlands. MJ noted that when the French families fled Paris upon the arrival of the Nazis, they often could only take what they could carry, and a violin case made a very good small suitcase, while hiding the contents. Themes that run through the story are the universal language of music and the power of music to heal. Beethoven's Ode to Joy, featured in the story, was played by student violinist Grace Zelewicz on the mysterious violin and Gretchen Dekker on keyboard.

DMC members want to thank MJ and Gretchen for making the long trip to Dushore to share this exciting musical story, and a special thank you to Sullivan County's own Grace Zelewicz for sharing her talent on the violin.



#### **State Festivals Competition**

PFMC was especially proud and excited to have our State Festivals Competition take place at Lycoming College in Williamsport this year on the Saturday following our 89th State Convention.

After the local Festivals are held throughout the State, only the students who receive a "Superior" rating can enter their Regional competitions. From there only the top winning students from the Regionals are invited to the State Competition to compete for monetary prizes, plaques and trophies.

Currently the State Competition is offering competitors to compete in Piano Solo from the Medium Class on up through Musically Advanced Class and Piano Concerto in both the Junior and Senior levels.

The Virginia Federation of Music Clubs took its first baby steps in 1920, and how she has grown! Just 32 years after the National Federation of Music Clubs (NFMC) was founded, representatives from the Virginia State Teachers Association and numerous State Music Clubs came together and took the initial steps to become a state organization under the NFMC. Since that historic gathering in Roanoke, Virginia, the Virginia Federation of Music Clubs (VFMC) has become a "Star State" within the NFMC. At its inception, the VFMC adopted the objectives established by the NFMC – to promote creative and performing arts in America and to foster young musical talent. To this end the VFMC has remained committed to high musical standards, the advancement of music and the arts in our communities, music education in our schools, and promotion of American music and musicians.

Virginia celebrates the home of two NFMC Presidents – Julia Fuqua Ober (1937-41) and Lana Bailey (2007-11). It was Julia Ober who interpreted the meaning of NFMC's blue and gold emblem. Lana Bailey was instrumental in securing the current location of NFMC headquarters in Greenwood, IN.

Celebrating 100 years in style, Virginia held its 2023 convention in the city of Roanoke, Virginia where it all began. Of course everyone showed up in their 1920's finery! Jazz Music created the mood for the evenings and High Tea was celebrated at the Hotel Roanoke along with a "visit" from our first VFMC President Mrs. James Procter Brown (Prudie). With such a wonderful occasion, the celebration lasted through the 2024 Convention. (You only celebrate 100 years once!)
