Howdy, Ya'll!! It's time to make your reservations for the NFMC 2025 National Convention to be held in Austin, TX, June 10-14, 2025, at the Hilton Austin Airport Hotel. You will find more information in the next few pages.

The hotel is located on the grounds of Bergstrom International Airport, and offers a 24-hour free shuttle to the airport, indoor and outdoor pools, restaurants, and comfortable meeting rooms. Guests at this spacious hotel will be treated to comfort, convenience, and a complimentary breakfast.

The capital of Texas, Austin is known as the cultural and economic center of central Texas. The official slogan of Austin as "The Live Music Capital of the World" is a reference to the city's musicians and live music venues. Austin is the home to the long running PBS TV series "Austin City Limits," as well as the site of South by Southwest (SXSW) an annual conglomeration of film, interactive media, and music festivals. You might want to stay an extra day in order to visit Lady Bird Johnson's Wildflower Center, the Bob Bullock museums, the Capital building, the University of Texas, or spend an evening on Sixth Street.

Tuesday is gathering day and, there will be an opportunity throughout the day to meet with National Officers and learn more about their duties and responsibilities. Various committees will meet throughout the day and the Festival Chorus will have its first rehearsal.

Hold on to your hats (cowboy, that is) for Tuesday night's truly Texas Experience. We will travel by bus to a nearby barbecue restaurant, where you will enjoy a delicious, authentic Texas barbecue, while humming along to the music of the Matt Fertitta Band, followed by an opportunity to learn a little line dancing. Bring your boots and prepare to join the fun!

Wednesday will be the official opening of the convention. The 1st Cavalry Color Guard and Army Band from Fort Cavazos (formerly Fort Hood) in Killeen, TX, will provide the opening ceremony. There will be workshops, meetings, and delightful musical moments throughout the day. And, of course, you will be reacquainted with friends from your sister states at the regional luncheons. This will be your first opportunity to visit the exhibit hall which opens Wednesday morning and runs through Friday. The hours will be listed in the program book.

A concert by Austin musicians known as Invoke will follow dinner. A reception, sponsored by the 5 regions of NFMC, will follow the concert. At this time attendees will have the opportunity to meet the Officer and Board Member-At-Large candidates.

Thursday will open with election of new Board Members-At-Large, followed by more workshops, division meetings and beautiful musical moments. Also on Thursday is the lovely Rose Fay Thomas luncheon, honoring the Rose Fay Thomas Fellows. All NFMC attendees are welcome to attend this luncheon. Of course, this is also an opportunity to become a Rose Fay Thomas Fellow.

Thursday night we will hear the 2005 Young Artist in Woman's Voice, Mela Dailey, perform in concert, followed by a reception sponsored by the Texas Federation of Music Clubs.

Friday will begin early with a "Lifers' Breakfast" to be attended by NFMC Life Members only. New Life Members are always welcome, with a \$400 contribution. Friday will feature the concert by the Festival Chorus.

Friday night we will honor our state presidents with a formal banquet, open to everyone. We will wait in anticipation for the announcement of the 2025 Young Artists. This is a good time to meet these talented young musicians and invite them to your state for a concert.

Finally, Saturday morning there will be a Memorial Breakfast remembering those who have passed away in the past year. The new board will meet and we will pack our bags, stuffed with the goodies and souvenirs we have acquired this week, say our good-byes and head for home.


She has also soloed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Berlin Philharmonic, Vienna Philharmonic and BBC Symphony Orchestra.

Brian Montgomery is known for a variety of baritone roles from his performances at the Metropolitan Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Arena di Verona, Bavarian State Opera, Hamburg State Opera, Stuttgart Opera, Glimmerglass Festival Opera and others.

For 12 years Mr. Montgomery resided in China, where he appeared with the opera companies of Beijing, Shanghai, and Hong Kong. He has also had a significant career as a recitalist and concert performer. He has also sung a dozen roles in Broadway musicals. He is the president of his own company, Classical Vocal Arts.

The career of **Lorraine Ernest**, soprano, has included appearances at the Metropolitan Opera, New York City Opera, Los Angeles Opera, Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center, Opera Philadelphia, Pittsburgh Opera, Denver Symphony Orchestra, Opera Grand Rapids, Palm Beach Opera, Central City Opera, and the Volksoper in Vienna. She currently teaches at the University of Oklahoma and is a member of the Board of Directors of Opera in the Ozarks.





ANDREW COOPERSTOCK, 1989 NFMC YOUNG ARTIST - PIANO



Pianist Andrew Cooperstock performs widely as soloist and chamber musician and has appeared throughout six continents and in most of the fifty states, including performances at New York's Alice Tully, Merkin, and Carnegie halls, Broadway's 54 Below, Greenwich Village's (le) Poisson Rouge, Brooklyn's BargeMusic, and at the United Nations. He has been featured in recitals and concerto appearances

at the Chautauqua, Brevard, and Round Top international music festivals, the Australian Festival of Chamber Music, Hong Kong's Hell Hot! New Music Festival, and in London, Beijing, Accra, Kiev, Sapporo, Canberra, Lima, and Geneva, on National Public Radio, Radio France, and the BBC.

An advocate for new music, Andrew Cooperstock has premiered works by American composers Lowell Liebermann, John Fitz Rogers, Rob Paterson, and Aaron Copland and participated in commissioning works by Eric Stern, Robert Starer, Dan Welcher, and Meira Warshauer.

A sought-after chamber musician, Cooperstock has performed with the Takács Quartet, the Ying Quartet, the Dorian Quintet, violinist James Buswell, violist Roberto Diaz, cellists Andres Diaz and András Fejér, hornist Eli Epstein, and pianist Paul Schoenfield. He is a member of the Colorado Chamber Players, a regular soloist with the Boulder Chamber Orchestra, and a founder of Trio Contraste, which specializes in commissioning and performing contemporary music for piano, violin, and clarinet.

With violinist William Terwilliger, as Opus Two (www.opustwo. org). Cooperstock has recorded the complete works for piano and violin by Aaron Copland. The award-winning duo has been internationally recognized for its "divine phrases, impelling rhythm, elastic ensemble and stunning sounds," as well as its commitment to expanding the violin-piano duo repertoire. The duo has appeared throughout North and South America, Europe, and

Australia, and it made its Asian debut in 2006 with performances across China, Korea, Japan, and the Russian Far East. In 2011 they were in residence with the National Symphony of Ghana, Africa, and at the University of Ghana Legon, and they were featured performers at Hong Kong's premier chamber music festival, Hell Hot! Their appearance at Woodstock, New York's prestigious Maverick Concerts was called "one of the most significant and worthwhile concerts of the 2010 season." In 2013 Opus Two were guests of the United States Embassy on tour throughout Peru. With cellist Andres Diaz, Opus Two has recorded chamber music by Lowell Liebermann (Albany Records) and Paul Schoenfield (Azica Records). Opus Two's recording of Leonard Bernstein (Naxos) features new arrangements by legendary Broadway music director Eric Stern and collaborations with Broadway actresssinger Marin Mazzie, and their following CD, a 75th-anniversary tribute to American composer George Gershwin, features a newlycommissioned Eric Stern arrangement of beloved songs from Girl Crazy and collaborations with Broadway singer Ashley Brown. Cooperstock's next solo recording, for Bridge Records, will pay tribute to Leonard Bernstein's centenary in 2018.

Andrew Cooperstock's media credits include performances on National Public Radio, WFMT Chicago, WOXR New York, KVOD Denver, KUT Austin, and on Minnesota Public Radio, Radio France, and the Australian and British Broadcasting Corporations.

Prize-winner in the National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist Competition, the New Orleans International Piano Competition, and the United States Information Agency's Artistic Ambassador Auditions, he has served as juror for the New Orleans International Piano Competition, the Iowa International Piano Competition, the Liszt-Garrison International Competition, China's Giant Cup Art Talent Competition, and the Music Teachers National Association national competitions, among others, and he has presented master classes widely, from Beijing to Nice to Vladivostok.

A graduate of the Juilliard School and the Cincinnati and Peabody Conservatories, Cooperstock studied with Abbey Simon, David Bar-Illan and Walter Hautzig, as well as with collaborative pianist Samuel Sanders. Cooperstock is currently Professor of Piano at the University of Colorado Boulder and faculty member at Saarburg International Festival of Music (Germany) and Classical Music Festival (Eisenstadt, Austria). He is also an honorary professor at Guangxi Arts Institute in southern China. Previous appointments include posts at the University of Oklahoma and Brevard Music Center. Cooperstock has recorded for the Naxos, Azica, Bridge and Albany labels, among others. He is a Steinway artist. 🎝



STUDENT COLLEGIATE AWARDS HAVE A PROFOUND EFFECT ON THE RECIPIENTS

Since it's inception, National Federation of Music Clubs has supported aspiring artists as they pursue their dreams of becoming professional musicians. The scholarships and monetary awards earned by these young artists have a profound effect on their trajectories, sometimes serving as a turning point in their pursuit of excellence. It is my pleasure to share the following updates from three of the 2023 Student Collegiate Biennial Auditions 1st-place winners.

BJORN KYDLAND (TRUMPET)

"The NFMC award helped me by pushing me over the line between scraping by and passing by with a little margin, freeing me up to take on some lower paying gigs to bolster my experience and improve my ensemble playing during a time when I otherwise would be practicing by myself and slowly losing touch.

I'm now a member of the Brockton Symphony Orchestra, and play with some different groups including the Boston Annex Players (BAP)."



JONATHAN BASS (PIANO)

"I graduated summa cum laude last June from Lawrence University, where I received a B.M. in piano performance with an emphasis in collaborative piano and a B.A. in French and francophone studies. I'm currently in Paris pursuing a graduate degree at the École normale de musique de Paris-Alfred Cortot, under Prof. David Lively. I'm here on a joint Fulbright-Harriet Hale Woolley grant, and am an artist-inresidence for the year at the **Fondation** des Etats-Unis where I am living. I've also

been able to attend several summer music programs as well in the last few years, including the Gijón International Piano Festival in Spain, and the inaugural Lawrence Chamber Music Festival. I'm currently in the midst of figuring out what happens for me after this year, and applying to further graduate music programs in the U.S. and Paris.

I will give a recital at the Fondation des Etats-Unis on April 3rd (in collaboration with my colleague here, an excellent painter whose works are often inspired directly by pieces of music), and several additional performances in Paris and at home in Wisconsin are in the works for later in the spring and summer. I'll certainly pass along the dates once they're solidified!

As you know, an artistic education can be very expensive for many reasons, and as a full-time student whose family is not in a position to finance my studies, I absolutely would not have gotten this far without the generous support of institutions and individuals such as the NFMC and its donors. I think many of my colleagues at Lawrence and in Paris would say similar things. That support really does make all the difference for folks such as myself, and it would be a wild understatement to say that I'm deeply grateful."

"Since receiving first place at the NFMC Student/Collegiate award two years ago, I have been performing and teaching while taking steps toward entering a master's degree program in Europe this fall. I have continued studies in historical performance with David

Kerr, founder of the **Portland Baroque Orchestra**. I have taught violin lessons at Trala School of Music and have now opened my own studio. Most recently, I won first prize in my age range at the Charleston International New Year's Competition. This summer, I plan to study with Almita Vamos at the **Chautaugua Summer Music Festival**. I will pass on the dates for my solo, chamber, and Orchestral performances at Chautauqua as I learn those dates.

Concurrently with my musical pursuits, I have been studying German to open up the possibility of studying in Germany. I was named the Kathryn Davis Fellow for Peace at the Middlebury German School last summer, and I will be spending four months this spring studying at the Kapito Language Institute in Münster.

The NFMC award has played a key role in enabling all of these endeavors. Because of my background of fundraising throughout middle and high school to raise my own funds for my music studies, receiving this award was very meaningful to me, and I am extremely grateful to the NFMC."

Pictured are the new NFMC Southeastern Region Fellows Medallion and Lapel Pin, symbols of an ongoing fundraising initiative for creating new scholarship endowments at Sewanee Summer Music Festival in Sewanee TN. and Eastern Music Festival in Greensboro, NC. The 5-year goal is an ambitious \$100,000 to be divided into two endowment funds of \$50,000 each. This

accomplishment will put Sewanee and EMF on a more equal footing with Brevard Music Center, where the SER established an endowment of \$50,000 over 10 years ago, known as the Beth McAuley Award. That endowment now provides an annual scholarship of \$2500 to a student from the SER, using only investment earnings.

The Chairperson for the SER Fellows Medallion is Ruth Morrow, who spearheaded the design with member input to incorporate symbolism throughout. First is the sun which suggests summertime and the summer music camps. The mountain range is reflective of the majestic Appalachians which run through many of the region's states.

Upon examination, a viewer will notice 4 different shades of blue in the water. One shade represents the small creeks and streams found throughout the SER. The 2nd blue shade represents the rivers and lakes where residents enjoy kayaking, water skiing, and other water

sports. The 3rd shade of blue represents the Gulf of Mexico which has boundaries with several of the most southern states. The final shade of blue represents the mighty Atlantic Ocean which borders several states on the eastern seaboard.



On the reverse side of the Medallion is a swirling music staff with 13 eighth notes. The cone-shaped staff suggests a hurricane which has become such a frequent phenomenon, they are given names, much like our own. The 13 eighth notes represent the 12 states and District of Columbia that comprise the SE Region. The states

are Maryland, West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and the District of Columbia.

The Medallions are the highest honor a member of the SER may attain. They can be purchased individually or may be presented by a group, club, or an individual to an outgoing officer who has gone above and beyond. The cost is a mere \$500, a trifle when we consider the most worthy cause, and the difference the scholarship endowments will make in young musicians lives.




